#### Guide Rock Wins; 8 to 4

Tuesday afternoon the Guide Rock ball team came over to do battle with the Red Cloud team at the Starke Field. Both teams had "spiked" up for the occasion, each team declaring they would be the winner; but at the close of the ninth inning, it was found that Guide Rock was the winner by a score of 8 to 4. At times the game was close and exciting and looked like the home team would nose out ahead, but Guide Rock out hit the local team and scored enough runs to win the game. This made the sixth defeat, all in a row, for Red Cloud, and unless something is done to secure harmony and good feeling among the players and management, Red Cloud may be without a ball team for the balance of the season.

#### Mervil Fentress Breaks Jail

Two of Smith county's free boarders effected a successful jail break about 1:30 Sunday morning, by drilling through their cell wall, removing the stones and then picking the outer lock. The two prisoners were Mervil Fentress, of Red Cloud who was serving time until district court on charge of stealing Bill Amis' Ford sedan and a man giving his name as Roy Wilson, who had been in a couple of weeks charged with robbing the Brandes Drug store at Kensington. Both men had pleaded guilty to the preliminary charges and were being held for trial.

Fentress and Wilson also stole \$11 from Jake Ewing who was in jail for the Gaylord bank robbery of a couple of months ago. Though Ewing did not attempt to escape with them he was afraid to tell the plans he knew. The men had been working on the plans for several days, and it is supposed were aided by tools smuggled in from the outside through pies and edibles sent to the prisoners.

After leaving the jail the men stole a Ford car from Bert Ireland, five miles south of Smith Center, driving it to within two miles of Osborne where it was abandoned out of gas. Then they made their way to Beloit by train, arriving there about 10 at night. It was near that place that Fentress was captured again and brought back to Smith Center. The other prisoner, Roy Wilson has not been located.—Smith County Journal.
