FARM BUREAU NOTES

WEBSTER COUNTY AT THE STATE FAIR

Red Cloud Clothing Club made two entries each of their sewing. Mildred Mizer won 1st on Kitchen Apron and 1st on Princess Slip. Elizabeth Mizer won 2nd on Sewing Bag and 3rd on Kitchen Apron. The Club won 2nd on their clothing exhibits in competition with 31 exhibits. Two members of this team Goldie McConkey and DeEtte Corner gave a Clothing Demonstration and ranked 8th with a score of 80, 15 teams competing. Cass county team won first, score 87. Mrs. W. H. Thomas is leader of this Club and she can feel mighty proud of the Club. This is the first time Webster county has competed in Girls' Club work at the State Fair.

JUDGING TEAMS

The Live Stock Judging team won 2nd. Dawson county winning first, 18 teams competing. Members of the team were Oscar Lea, Cecil Means, and Eugene White. Oscar Lea ranked first in judging cattle, Cecil Means ranked 2nd in horses and 3rd in sheep. Cecil Means ranked 4th as individual, Oscar Lea 6th and Eugene White 9th.

DAIRY JUDGING TEAM

The Dairy Judging team also won second, Adams county winning first. Members of this team were Lorimer Edson, William Arndt and Robert Overing. William Arndt ranks 3rd on Holsteins. The individual ranking of the team was Lorimer Edson 4th, William Arndt 6th and Robert Overing 10th.

DEMONSTRATION TEAMS

The Calf Club team demonstrating the selection, feeding and fitting of a calf won first and champion, their score was 95. Eugene White and Lorimer Edson were on the team. They will give a demonstration at the Ak-Sar-Ben next week following they will represent Nebraska at the Interstate Fair Sioux City Iowa and compete with champion teams from the other states.

The Pig Club team represented by Cecil Means and Oscar Lea ranked 4th.
