**Liquid Air Explosive.**  
When liquid air, containing from 40 to 50 per cent of oxygen, is mixed with powdered charcoal it forms an explosive which is said to be comparable in power to dynamite, and can be exploded by means of a detonator. This explosive has been tested in coal mines. The liquid air evaporates so rapidly that the explosive cannot be stored, but must be used within a few minutes after it is prepared.

**Remarkable Carving.**  
San Franciscans are paying homage to one of the most remarkable wooden statues ever received, says Popular Mechanics Magazine. It is the work of Hananuma Masakichi, greatest Japanese artist in wood or ivory, who posed for himself by the aid of adjustable mirrors and carved his own life-sized image from wood. The hair on the figure is the artist's own. He used the clippings from his head and beard, boring tiny holes for the hairs and setting them in place one by one. The figure is in every particular, even the most minute, an exact counterpart of the artist. The carving required three years, even to so adroit and masterly a workman as Masakichi.

**For French Children.**  
Child welfare agencies of France have been combined into one loose organization known as the general child welfare bureau. The work of the organization is divided into sections; that on school hygiene has studied medical inspection of school children and the question of school nurses; the section on assistance has collected information on all agencies giving aid to children; a section on publicity is carrying on a general campaign of education through lectures, newspaper articles and pamphlets in favor of child hygiene.

Democratic legislatures gave you state taxes varying from \$1.36 to \$1.69 on every thousand dollars worth of property you possessed. The present state administration cost \$3.30 per thousand for 1922, levied in 1921. Some difference, isn't there?

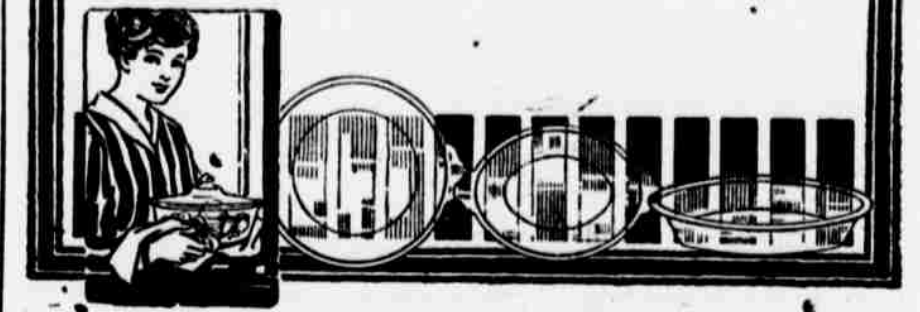
