Democratic Candidates

Spoke Here Wednesday

Wednesday afternoon the first political speaking for the fall election was held by the Democrats in this city at which time a large number of men and women were present. Chairman F. J. Munday after making a few timely remarks introduced Hon. A. C. Shallenberger, candidate for congress, who made a good speech, he dwelt on the present unjust and high taxation in this state and other issues and closed by stating that if elected he would make a fight for lower freight and passenger rates. Senator G. M. Hitchcock then took the floor and discussed the tariff law and currency system and closed by stating that he was against repealing the Volstead Act.

SHOOTERS ATTENTION

October 8th will be the first shoot on the Davis Cup now on display in the United Grocery stores window.

A series of 6 shoots 50 targets per man 300 in all, added bird handicap giving the new shooters the same chance or better than the experienced one:

A's average is 47-50. A starts with 3 added birds. A breaks 47-50 plus 3 added total 50 giving A one point on the cup and a chance to be in the final shoot off. The second shoot A gets only 2 added. A breaks 45-50 plus 2 total 47 not a perfect score, but A will get 5 added at the third shoot. Each shooter will be handicapped by his previous shooting.

B average is 30 out of 50-added birds 20. B breaks 40-50-20 added 60 not 60 because if B broke them all he could only get 50 giving B one point on the cup, but the next shoot B would only get 10 added instead of 20 at the 6th shoot. All that have a point on the cup will have the final shoot off 25 targets each being handicapped on 25 targets instead of 50 the winner taking the cup.

Each shooter winning a point on the cup will receive a silver spoon.

The one that actually breaks the most targets on the 300 will receive a trap shooters emblem, watch fob.

We want women, men and boys to come out and learn to shoot, but to compete for these trophies, shooter must be a member of the Red Cloud Gun Club. Fee of \$2.00 being paid to secretary.

Shoots will be held starting October 8th at 2 o'clock every two weeks. Visitors always welcome.
