OF the regular committee, J. R. Scott, M. L. Boom and George Amack were present but A. L. Grossman was not there and Mary Peterson

sent a good substitute in A. H. Hoffman. Many subjects were brought before this committee and were discussed, pro and con in a broad way. These resolutions are just to make people think, and come prepared to help decide by constructive criticism or evident approval, whether they must stand or fall. They may seem radical, but it just voices a change wanted from always letting the farmer pay most of the taxes. The farmer wishes to divide the burden with others. Some of these resolutions received quick response from the committee, but most of them were deliberated over before passing.

We submit the following:  
1 Be it resolved that a majority of signatures of all county voters must be secured to continue the county agent.  
2 That the county officers hiring deputies must pay same out of their own pockets.  
3 That the county assessor be abolished.  
4 That the county engineer be abolished.  
5 That the truant officer be abolished.  
6 That the county commissioners should adopt the Federal census of 1920 as a basis for fixing the salary of the county sheriff and the county attorney.  
7 Resolved that the Domestic Science, Manual Training, Teachers Normal Training and Business courses be abolished from the accredited courses of our public schools.
