### For Nearly a Million

Another special assessment of \$800,-000 to \$900,000 will be necessary about the first of January to replenish the state bank guaranty fund and being it up to the minimum of 1 per cent of a crage deposits for the preceding six months, as required by law. This will be in addition to the regular assessment due January 1, amounting to about \$118,000

The fund has again become seriously depleted by being drawn upon several times recently for payment of depositors in failed banks. At present the balance is about 51,300-000. This is a million dollars less than the legal requirement of 1 percent on deposits . The guaranty law makes it mandatory on the state banking bureau to levy special assessments when necessary to bring up the amount on hand to that figure.

Within the past two years, four special assessments have been made aggregating \$2,500,000 or more, and the one now in prospect will raise the total to at least \$3,300,000. This is in addition to what the banks are required to set side as regular assessments every six months, at the rate of one-twentieth
