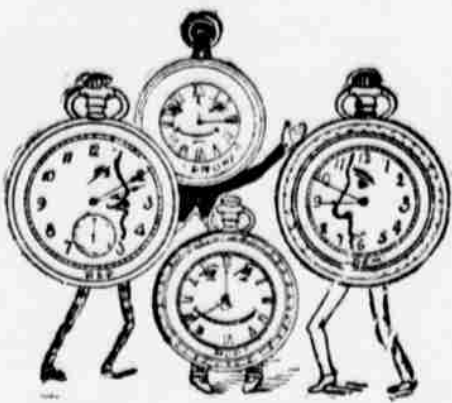

#### Wins from Superior.

The Red Cloud Mavericks took the first game from Superior on our diamond by a score of 2 to 1, after defeating them twice on their home grounds. The game was a fast exhibition of ball few errors only one being chalked up against the Mavericks and two against the Superior Warriors.

In the first inning it looked bad for Masters, the far famed Blue Jacket walked, Bright beat out a bunt, Gorman struck out and Drebert out from pitcher to first, Blue Jacket stealing third and Bright second but the new married man threw out Dohl at first, no runs. Good playing and pitching by Masters kept Superior from scoring. Superior scored their only run in the fifth inning. Cheoteau singled was sacrificed to second by Harris, Dohl flew out to Nelson, Cheoteau reaching third on the out, Blue singled scoring Cheoteau. After that they were handed goose eggs. A fast double play in the sixth, Bradbrook to Walters retired the side and kept them from scoring. Red Cloud scored their first run in the second inning on a two base hit by Masters, a sacrifice by Walters and a passed ball, and the second run in the sixth on an error by Cheoteau, a sacrifice by Adams and a two base hit by Schoonover scoring Bradbrook. Score 2 to 1.

This was the only time they were able to send a man across for a run.

Red Cloud started their run getting in the second inning. Stone singled, Walters sacrificed, Nelson got his base on balls, Smith struck out, and then Saunders hit for a safe one, scoring Nelson. In the seventh inning the Mavericks gathered in a couple of

scores which ended the rungetting for both teams.

Clegg for the Mavericks and Snyder for the visitors each pitched strong games and received support that was almost perfect. Altogether it was one of the prettiest games seen on the home grounds this season.
