### AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT.

An automobile accident occurred last Saturday while a party of young men were returning from Hastings and it seems almost a miracle that no one was killed. Ed. Hass, Clayton Ranney Chas. Moede and Clarence Frame went up to Hastings Saturday afternoon in the latter's car and it was on returning that evening that the accident happened. They were returning on the west road by way of Roseland. They had come about half way, when in going down a hill the front wheel went into a rut and threw the car off from the road and over an embankment. The car turned completely over with all four of the boys in it, and then onto its side, catching Ed. Hass underneath. The car had to be lifted up to get Ed. out from under it. Outside of the latter none of the other occupants were hurt outside of a shaking up and a few scratches. Ed. however was pretty badly bruised up, and was confined to his home for several days.

The accident happened so quick they are unable to tell much about it, and it was over before they hardly knew anything was wrong. The evening was moon light and the lights were practically useless, and the roads could have been seen much earlier had it been darker.

It was not through any carelessness on the part of Clarence Frame, who was driving the car, that the accident occurred.—Blue Hill leader
