 Mrs. Kesler whose maiden name was Ellen J. Botsford was born in Jackson county, Iowa, and was married October 9, 1871, to D. W. Nice. To the union, two children were born, Charles W. Nice, of Wallace, Idaho, and Mrs. Nora E. Wilhelmson, of Forest Grove.
 At Red Cloud, Nebraska, Mrs. D. W. Nice was united in marriage to David Kesler on February 5, 1880. After residing there for some time Mr. and Mrs. Kesler came to Oregon about six years ago and settled in Forest Grove. Mrs. Kesler had been a member of the Methodist Episcopal church for a good many years but was not a member of the local church. Her husband, David Kesler, died October 20, 1908, in this city. J. M. Botsford of Portland, a twin brother, is the only remaining member of a family of eleven children.
