### Commissioners' Proceedings

Red Cloud, Mar. 2 1909. Board met pursuant to adjournment. Members present, W. R. Anderson, T. J. Chaplin, C. Ohmstede and J. G. Overman.

On motion, Overing Bros. were refunded \$56.41, being the amount of tax assessed against them in 1903 in error and paid under protest, less amount owing the county for stone purchased by said firm, amounting to \$45, leaving a balance of \$11.41, and county treasurer was instructed to refund that amount and credit the \$45 to the bridge fund.

Annual settlement was made with the following road overseers; J. R. Laird, dist. 4; Henry Hanfield, dist. 3; Wm. Copley, dist. 14.

On motion, petition of F. C. Buschow and others for road at Blue Hill was granted as prayed for, and consent of parties adjacent to the road given with the waiver signed by them on condition that they be paid \$40 each for 20 foot strip from their land. Clerk was ordered to plat same on road plat book.

On motion it was resolved that no claims for material be allowed for bridges unless accompanied by an order from the district commissioner; and that all road overseers be notified that they are not to attempt to purchase lumber without first securing such order; above resolution to take effect at once; lumbermen to file their claims with the county quarterly.

Motion made by Pulsipher and second by McArthur that parties having wiring done must get an estimate of same and pay for the wiring in ad-

vance. Carried.  
Claim of T. C. Miller \$110 and \$60.74 was laid over.

Now comes before the council Ralph Poe on behalf of the B. & M. R. R. Co., and asks the council to agree on a price to be paid by the company on a contract to light the depot and round house. Whereupon the council agreed upon an 8c rate.

Now comes before the council W. H. Taber and represents to the council that he has been using considerable current running the Tepee and asks the council if it can be done to give him a better rate than he is now getting from the city for current used. Whereupon the matter was referred to the Light Committee.
