Base Ball Meeting.
At a mass meeting of the citizens held at the Commercial Club rooms last Friday evening a Base Ball association was formed with W. S. Bense, President, O. C. Teel, Secretary Treasurer, and F. W. Cowden, W. A. Sherwood and G. J. Warren, Executive Committee. The plan adopted by the association, was to subscribe not less than 50 shares, at \$20 each. One half to be paid May 15th and the other one half July 15th 1909. The season is to begin June 1st, 1909 and to last three months or longer.

The Executive committee together with the President and Secretary Treasurer is to be as an Executive Board, and is to have entire control and management of the affairs of the association. The Executive Board met Monday afternoon and formulated the following rules, which were adopted Monday evening at another meeting of the association:—That the name of this association shall be "The Red Cloud Base Ball Association of Red Cloud, Nebraska."

The time of commencement of this association shall be March 15th, 1909, and to continue until September 1st, 1909, or as much longer as may be determined upon by the executive board. That any officer may be removed for cause, and his position filled by a majority vote of the said Board. The Executive Board has power to make and enforce such rules to govern its business as deemed expedient, to make contracts and regulate all salaries. To employ and discharge at will any employee, to engage a manager who shall have full power and authority over its employees.

The liability of each share holder shall be the amount of his share and no more. The Board cannot incur an indebtedness to exceed 85 per cent of the unpaid subscription. All money shall be paid to the Secretary-Treasurer, who shall issue a receipt for the same in duplicate. All moneys shall be paid out only on order of the manager countersigned by the President and Chairman of the Executive committee, all orders to be issued in duplicate.

All employees shall enter into such contract as shall be formulated and adopted by the Executive Board. The manager shall have power to penalize or fine any employee and such sum shall be deducted from any salary due such employee. The Executive Board shall appoint from the share holders, not members of the Board, a committee of three to audit its accounts at the end of the season. And no complimentary tickets shall be issued to any person not employed by said Board.

Base ball enthusiasts will be pleased to know that an organization has been perfected in this city and that Red Cloud will have a winning team this year. The management learned a few lessons last year and the present association will take advantage of last year's experience. The association is organized on strictly business principles and business methods will be used throughout the entire season.

Every body speak a good word and help bring the people to Red Cloud. W. S. Bense is president and O. C. Teel is secretary and treasurer. Frank Cowden, Geo. Warren and Walter Sher-wood Executive Board. These men at the head of this association are a guar-antee in themselves that the club will be managed strictly on the square.
