Report of Water & Light Commissioner.

RED CLOUD, NEBR., April 28th, '09.
TO THE HONORABLE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL.

Gentlemen:—Since my last report, April 7th, 1909, which showed \$944.98 collected and turned in to the city treasurer. I have collected \$132.28 for the water service and \$126.51 for the light fund, making a total of \$258.79 since April 7th, 1909.

I have installed three new water meters for new consumers of water and five new electric light meters for additional light patrons.

Have also finished street series lights on South Walnut street, erected three new poles and transferred street wires to them on the north side of west 2nd—between South Seward and South Cedar—repaired broken street lamps at South Cedar and West 2nd street. Also repaired street lamp that was burned out in the Platt's addition. Extended the Domestic line one block south in the Platt addition so as to furnish current to new residences. Also erected poles and put up new street lamp at the intersection of 8th Ave. and Cherry street.

There has been four breaks in domestic water service pipe caused by defective pipe which has been repaired. There has also been four new taps made in the water mains and meters attached in properly constructed meter vaults.

I have also repaired two culverts, water ways at street intersections, besides doing other necessary street work. I have also removed the city supplies from main room of F. & M. Bank building. I have also attended to other matters in detail as per your instructions.

Pitcher Len Schroeder, who was purchased by the Lincoln Base Ball Club from Burlington, Iowa, of the Central Association, last summer for \$500 was given his first trial for Lincoln last week against the State University. Schroeder has all the earmarks of a great pitcher and will probably win many games for Lincoln during the approaching season.

One of the greatest pitching duels ever seen on the Lincoln Base Ball Club's grounds occurred last Friday, when Green's Nebraska Indians played the Lincoln Western League Club. Tobey pitched for the Indians and Johnson for the Lincoln team. Johnson was formerly the star pitcher of the Indians and so was working against his old team mates. Tobey allowed only four hits and Johnson only three. For seven innings neither team got a man to second base. Then a lucky hit by Davidson after an error by the Indian third baseman, scored

the only two runs of the game. Lincoln won 2 to 0.

Harris, the little Hooper, Nebraska boy has been selected as utility player on the Lincoln team this season. Harris is not yet twenty-one years old and last season was practically his first experience in any kind of base ball, but he has developed rapidly and promises to make a great ball player.
