The New Council

The city council met Tuesday night and closed up their business for the year and adjourned sine die.

The new council immediately convened and elected J. A. McArthur as president of the council.

The following committees were appointed for the year:

Streets and alleys, Palsipher 1st ward, McArthur 2nd ward

Finance, Bailey, Oatman, McArthur.

Mayor Potter delivered a business like inaugural address to the council setting out the work before them for this year, emphasizing the necessity of immediately determining the financial condition of the city and the keeping of the records in a live condition at all times. Mr. Potter acquitted himself creditably and promised the council his aid at all times.

Saloon licenses were granted to Polnick & Longtin, Doyle & Bushee, and Wm Upright.

George W. Burgess of Alma was appointed water and light commissioner at \$100 per month. Mr. Burgess comes highly recommended and his qualifications are of the highest kind. He has been engaged in this business since he was a boy of 13 and has the practical experience of every department. The citizens of Red Cloud have reason to expect much of the new officer as he enjoys an enviable reputation both for ability and integrity. The fact that he has made good at Alma ought to be sufficient guarantee that he will do the same for us.

The new council, as judged by their first meeting, seem to be humanitarian and they showed a disposition to work together for the best interests of the city. If they continue to hold the high aim as disclosed by the first meeting thru out the year they will render much service to the city. We were much pleased with the evident desire upon the part of all to give the city a straight forward business administration.

City Clerk, O. C. Teel took to his new duties like a duck to water and he will unquestionably be of considerable assistance to the mayor and council. His occupation qualifies him exceptionally well for his new duties. As to clerical ability no better material can be found in the city than Mr. Teel and his predecessor Mr. Fort. While we have every confidence in Mr. Teel we believe it is due the retiring clerk, Mr. Fort, to say that he has served the city faithfully and efficiently and deserves the praise and appreciation of all our citizens.

The Chief trusts that the new council will become derelict in no duty and that they will give us the exact condition of the city within sixty days. We hold ourselves in readiness to uphold them in all things which are for the best interests of the city but should they so far forget themselves as to drift into negligence or mismanagement we feel it incumbent upon us to give the full and true facts and information to our readers. We much prefer to praise but if we must condemn the fault will not lay with us. The city demands as never before an administration of the highest character and we have confidence in the new officers and believe that they will render us efficient economic service.

Council adjourned to meet Wednesday evening.

C. H. Potter appointed J. W. Kinsel night watch temporarily. Moved by Oatman second by Bailey that J. W. Kinsel act as night watch temporarily

for a salary of \$25 per month until the next regular meeting of the Council. Yeas Bailey and Oatman. Nays McArthur.

Mayor appointed Col. E. M. Gard Day Marshal to serve with out any expense to the city. Yeas McArthur, Bailey, Oatman. Carried.

Mayor instructed McArthur to see that the county turned the water north of the city into Crooked Creek.

Nebraskans Will See Exhibit.

Whether Nebraskans go to Seattle or not to attend the Alaska-Yukon exposition, they will have an opportunity to see the government exhibits from the Department of Agriculture at home.

This exhibit is larger in itself than those at any previous exposition except the Louisiana purchase exposition at St. Louis. Eight cars will be required to take the exhibit to Seattle.

It is on the return trip that this great display will stop in Nebraska for two weeks and will comprise a part of the government exhibit at the National Corn Exposition to be held in Omaha.

The exhibit will be made in sections by six different bureaus including those of animal industry; forest service; plant industry; horticultural department; fiber investigation and corn investigation bureaus.

Nebraska raises cattle, hogs, sheep and the bureau of animal industry will have an exhibit of unusual interest, showing all practical ways of handling stock, eradicating disease, sanitary handling of dairy cows; the method of meat inspection which is used by the bureau.

Hemp has been shown to be a crop which will make profits for growers in Nebraska. The government has been working with the fiber. The process of manufacture will be seen in the exhibit at Omaha and Nebraska hemp will be used.

The forestry bureau shows the adaptability of different timber, the preservation of construction timbers as well as hundreds of pictures of forests in the northwest. It is an attractive exhibit even in a state where lumbering is unknown.
