 Otto W. Pope was born in Red Cloud May 1st 1877 and died in Red Cloud May 4th, 1909. He was the third child of the late Arthur A. Pope and Laura J. Pope. Mr. Pope was educated in the schools of this city and the University of Nebraska. For a number of years he was engaged in business in this city. In 1902 he was married to Anna Randall, who survives him. By his upright character the deceased was worthy of emulation and by his death the community lost a valued citizen. In the death of Mr. Pope a life was closed unheralded and unsung but having filled a niche in an honorable way. Mr. Pope leaves behind him the memory of a pleasing personality and a record upon which no shadow rests. We tender to his widow and relatives our sympathy because of this affliction.

COMMERCIAL CLUB VISITORS.
