If the field is level we would advise the use of a riding cultivator, but if hilly, it is almost necessary to use a walking cultivator. After cultivating corn all day a man is much more ambitious to do the chores when having had the benefit of riding. Never keep your team in the field more than five hours at a stretch, and not to total more than ten hours in any one day. A team working ten hours perday will walk further during the season than the team that works longer. Regularity in work is what counts in animals as well as men. When you take the horses to the barn at night, give them a good currying and rubbing down; never speak to them above an ordinary tone of voice; do not strike or abuse them, and do not keep a hired man who does In a very short time horses will learn to treat you as you treat them. As you would have men and animals treat you, so treat them Some have asked us to recommend some certain cultivator.
