Maggie Kiser was married to Dr. J. W. Robinson Dec. 28, 1879. To them were born four daughters, Maude the eldest died at about eight years of age. The others are Bertha (Mrs. Wm. McPherson) Ariminta Mae (Mrs. Lee Simpson) and Geneva Robinson.

Mrs. Robinson was for several years a member of the M. E. church and when the Christian's organized here in 1897 she transferred her membership to that, as it was the church of her choice. She was a member of several societies and was one of the Vice-Presidents of the W. C. T. U. She was a charter member of Guide Rock Lodge, No. 158 Degree of Honor organized

here March 31, 1897, and carried a beneficiary of \$1000. She was elected Lady of Honor at the time of organization, then Chief and became a Past Chief, then she served three years as Financier, then again passed thru the chairs being the P. C. of H. at time of her death. She was always at her post and never shirked a duty, but always did more than her share of work.

The funeral was conducted at the Baptist church at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon by Rev. J. M. Steeley. The casket was carried from the house to the church between lines of Degree of Honor and W. C. T. U. members. The pall bearers were members of the A. O. U. W. Lodge, Messrs: W. S. Lambert, C. W. Corwin, Alva Miner, J. H. Cray, C. S. Jones, James Watt. Lovely floral pieces, cut flowers, emblems, ect. were sent by the various orders and societies of which she was a member. The singers were Mesdames, Maude Fairfield, Belle Sabin, Mabel Roland, Maggie Cray, Messrs John Yung, George W. Crow, and Russell Vaughan.

The Degree of Honor gave its beautiful service at the cemetery. The burial team consisted of five members: P. C. of H., Ella Van Woert, C. of H., Idella Watt, L. of H., Winnie Cassell, C. of C., Clara Parker, R. Ida F. Hayes. Mrs. Maggie Robinson will be greatly missed. She always assisted everyone who was ill or needed assistance, and sympathized with all in sorrow and distress. The family have the sympathy of all in their great sorrow.
