Picture No. 2 - Two weeks ago a big bank failed in Oklahoma. Within three days every depositor was paid in full out of the fund created by the Oklahoma bank guarantee law, and there was not a penny's worth of trouble in the town when the bank failed.

Suppose we should have a bank failure in Nebraska. The courts have killed our Nebraska bank guarantee law, and our people would have no more protection than the people of Wisconsin had when their bank failed.

How long will the people submit to this constant killing of good laws by court judges who are friendly to the big interests? Is it not about time for the people to wake up and pay more attention to the election of judges of our courts?

Next Tuesday the people of Nebraska will have a chance to express an opinion about the bank guarantee law. All men ought to have an opinion on such an important law. William Hayward, chairman of the republican state committee has an opinion. He expressed that opinion in a recent speech. He said the Nebraska law to guarantee bank deposits was "bum-rubber" and ought to be killed. He is trying to elect certain candidates for seats on the supreme bench. These republican candidates now being boosted by Chairman Hayward are in sympathy with his views. The democratic candidates for supreme judge are friendly to the principle of the bank guarantee law. It ought to be easy for voters who believe in a bank guarantee law to make a choice next Tuesday. The voter who believes a bank guarantee law ought to be killed should vote for Hayward's republican candidates, because those candidates are friendly to a bank guarantee law. The voter who believes we ought to have a bank guarantee law in Nebraska should vote for the democratic candidates for supreme judge, because those candidates are friendly to the principle of the law to guarantee bank deposits, and the federal supreme court is liable to refer this law to our state supreme court for final decision.

Danger.

Five years ago, by order of the railroads and other special interests, the Nebraska legislature took away from the people the right to elect their own precinct assessors. This was done on the theory of the railroad attorneys that the people, and especially the farmers, could not be trusted to elect local assessors who would assess farm lands as high as the railroads wanted the lands assessed.

Last year the people took the bit in their teeth and elected legislators who were pledged to give back to the people the right to elect their own township assessors, and the legislature did give back to the people that right.

That good new law is in danger. One of the big railroad attorneys announced last week that soon after the election he would attack that new law in the supreme court. What can the people do to checkmate the move which the big railroad attorney says he will make? They can do much, if they want to. That attorney will not attack the new law unless he can attack it in a friendly court. If the people will go to the polls next Tuesday and elect supreme judges who are in favor of killing the local assessor law, then the attack will be made by the railroad attorney, and the law will certainly be killed. If the people shall elect next Tuesday some supreme judges who are known to favor the principle of home rule in the matter of making assessments, than this good new law will permit to live, because the railroad attorneys will not attack the law if they know that two or three members of the court are favorable to the law. The republican candidates for supreme judge are friendly to the view of the railroad attorneys who want to kill the local assessor law. The democratic candidates for supreme judge are known to be in sympathy with the law which gives the people the right to elect their own local assessors. Take your choice, voters. If you want to kill the law which permits you to have a voice in the election of the men who will assess your property, you know how to do it. If you want to have that good law, you also know how to do it.

Claims that the new warden at the penitentiary has been doing much for the convicts are being decisively confirmed from time to time. He is credited with having improved the physical surroundings of the prisoners, and to have ridden the penitentiary of the dope habit, but he has accorded the prisoners a voice in the discussion of public affairs.

When the Baptist conference in Lincoln recently adopted resolutions denouncing the governor for having chosen Rev. James Huff of South Omaha as prison chaplain, it certainly had something coming to it which came from various sources, of the kind merited, but it remained for the prisoners in the penitentiary to hand the preachers the warmest bunch, which they did in the following resolutions:
