Special efforts are being put forth this year by our city teachers along the line of spelling and writing in our schools. To stimulate activity among the children Messers, Cowden, Overman, Platt and Albright have each agreed to give ten dollars toward a prize fund. Three prizes, \$10, \$6 and \$4 will be awarded to the boys or girls who at the end of the year show the most improvement in their writing. A sample of each child's writing which was taken the first week of school which will furnish a bases of comparison with the child's writing at the end of the year. This is not a competitive test as to who is the best writer but a test as to who has made the most improvement. Three prizes of \$10, \$6 and \$4 will also be awarded to the boys or girls who show the greatest proficiency in spelling. At the close of the school year an oral spelling test will be held to which the public will be invited. In the spelling test each grade will be tested only on such words which have been assigned by the teacher in their respective grades, consequently this will only be a competition test in as far as it applies to each grade. The words to be used for these children will be the best number of words which they have had during their year's spelling work in school. All children from the 2nd to the 7th grades are eligible to the writing and spelling contest.

Nebraska Will Exhibit.

Among the twenty-five state exhibits at the National Corn Exposition, the Nebraska exhibit from the Agricultural college at Lincoln, will be among the most graphic which will be shown. It will make it possible for visitors to see in a short time the results of years of work and thus save them years of experimenting.

The exhibit is entirely in charge of the college. It will feature certain lines of plant breeding work. The Horticultural department will put on a display illustrating some of the hereditary laws which take effect when different varieties of plants are crossed. These laws will largely be illustrated by the use of beans and popcorn. The growing plants will be on exhibition, showing the parent plants and their progeny in each case.

These plants and others which will be shown by the Nebraska experimental farmers and educators are now growing under glass at Lincoln and will be taken to Omaha, like chicks hatching in an incubator, that the visitors may see the actual change in plant life being wrought by the experts who by the use of science are simplifying farming.

Some of the most interesting results in corn breeding work will also be illustrated and the oat tests will form an important part of the exhibit.

Another feature will be a collection of swine bones. These bones might not mean much to the ordinary observer, but the Nebraskans propose to show the 200,000 farmers who will visit the exposition from December 6 to 18, just what the various rations produce in the way of bones in hogs—a very important thing when the hog feeder stops to think about it. Another feature will be an exhibit from the North Platte experiment station, showing that "all of Nebraska is good."
