Thanksgiving is an annual festival
 of thanksgiving for the mercies of the
 closing year. The day is not a regular
 holiday but since 1863 the Presidents,
 Governors and Mayors have always ap-
 pointed the last Thursday in Novem-
 ber as Thanksgiving Day.

It is interesting to know that the
 first Thanksgiving observed in the
 United States took place at Plymouth
 in 1621 about ten months after the
 landing of the Pilgrims. This feast
 was not unlike the Jewish festivals for
 it took place out of doors and continued
 for five days. Massachusetts and about
 ninety Indians joined the colonists
 bringing five deer with them. They
 killed in one day enough fowl to last
 them all one week. As most of the
 fowl were turkeys that delicious bird
 became intimately connected with
 Thanksgiving Day.

The Pilgrims did not observe the
 day regularly but appointed various
 periods of the year from May to Decem-
 ber and at intervals of some four or
 five years.

Congress recommended days of
 thanksgiving annually during the
 Revolution and in 1784 for the return
 of peace. Says John Winslow: "The
 crowning step in this development,
 which is now national, was when the
 fortunes of our late war were in favor
 of the Union, and a proclamation for
 a national thanksgiving was issued by
 our then president, dear old Abraham
 Lincoln." That the festival shall here-
 after and forever be national is a part
 of our unwritten law."

Webster county as a commonwealth
 free of debt has cause to rejoice on
 this thanksgiving day more fully than
 ever before. No inmate resides in the
 county poor farm and our people as a
 whole have enough and to spare.

The present management of this
 paper deems it a fitting occasion to ex-
 press his thanks to friends in particu-
 lar and to the public in general who
 have so kindly given aid when it was
 most needed and for the generous sup-

We as a people ought to feel deeply

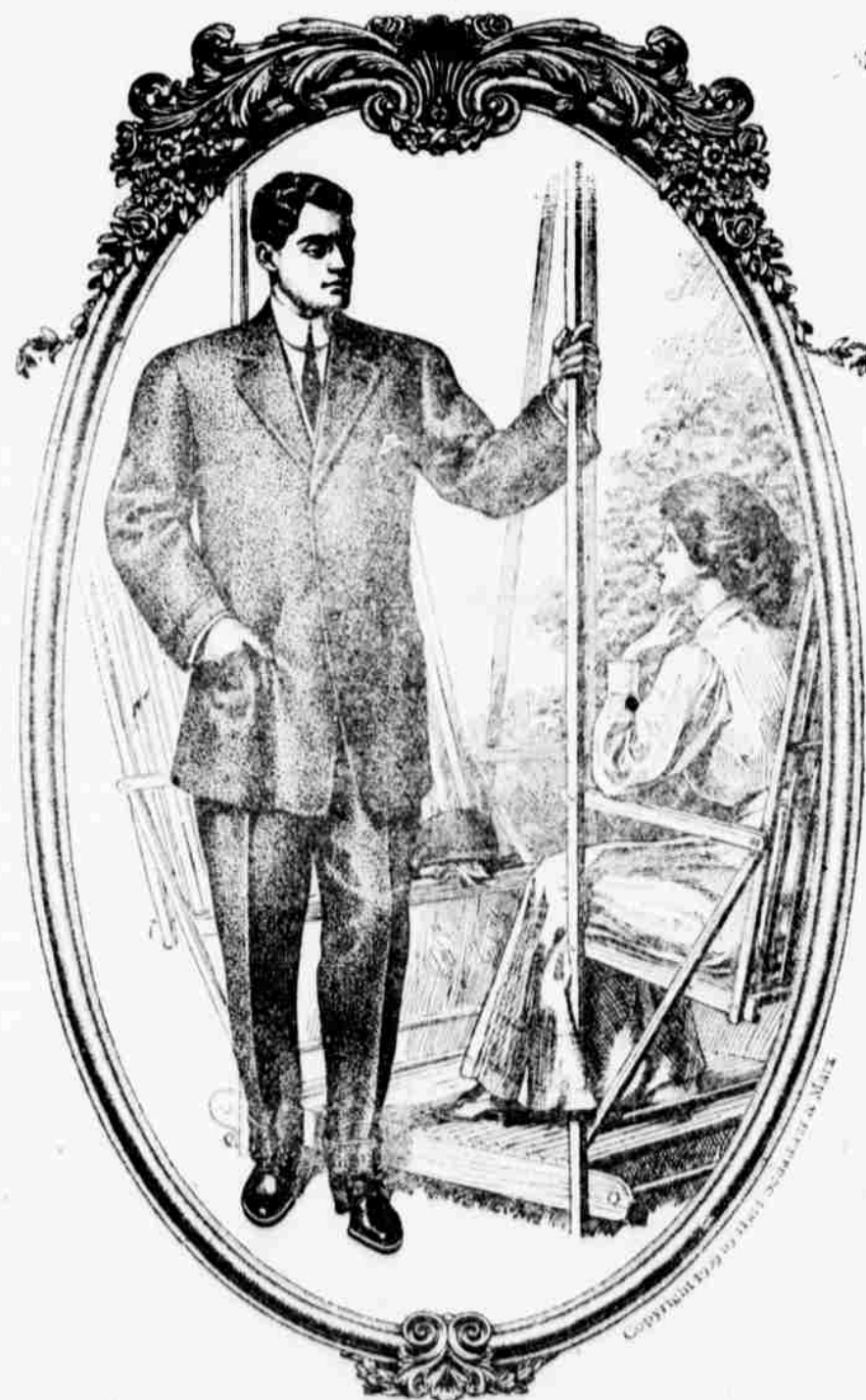
