**Passed Away.**

Mr. Leartus Campbell died at his home in Cowles Jan. 9, 1910. Funeral services were held at the house conducted by the minister of the Christian church. He was born in Wayne County Pennsylvania in the year 1844 and died from attack of pneumonia at the age of 65 years 9 months and 21 days. Mr. Campbell located on a homestead in this country some thirty odd years ago where he lived continually till 1906 when he moved to Cowles to spend the remainder of his days. He was one of our pioneer settlers and was greatly esteemed by all who knew him. He served his country in the civil war from 1861 to 1865 and received an honorable discharge. The remains were brought to this city Tuesday afternoon and was met by a large number of old soldiers who joined in the funeral procession to the cemetery. Rev. Stiffler of the Methodist church conducted the short ceremony at the grave. He leaves to mourn his loss a wife, two sons, and four daughters, two brothers and two sisters besides a host of friends.
