ACCIDENTS

While Mrs. Pete Liederbrand and her son were driving to town Tuesday with butter and eggs their team became frightened at something and started to run away. They both jumped out of the buggy and Mrs. Liederbrand struck her head against a stone or the hard ground rendering her unconscious for several hours. For a time it was feared that she had lost her life but at the present time she is gaining and will probably recover. Her son was uninjured and the strangest part of the accident is that the team came into town and stopped without beaking an egg or doing any damage. It was a narrow escape and might have resulted much more seriously.

Quite a serious accident happened to Mr. Tom Kralick yesterday while he was cutting wheat. In some manner some twine got wrapped around the shafting of his binder and he got down between his horses and the machine when without any warning the team started to run. Mr. Kralick was dragged about twenty five feet and badly cut about the back while his right foot was nearly severed. Mr. Kralick is in a critical condition and hopes for his recovery are slight. His wounds were promptly dressed but the loss of blood and the shock to his system is enough it is believed to cause his death.

DEATHS AND FUNERALS

C. C. Cowden

in Chicago June 23, 1910 C. C. Cowden of this city. Courtland C. Cowden was born in Madison, Indiana, Jan. 22, 1842 and was therefore aged at the time of his death 68 years, 5 months and 1 day. Mr. Cowden was one of the first settlers of Nebraska arriving at Nebraska City before the Civil War. He was intimately acquainted with all the trials and hardships of pioneer life. He was always loyal to his country responding first to her call by enlisting in the second Nebraska cavalry which was organized to repel a threatened Indian invasion from the North. He served his country faithfully and well in the great Civil War and received an honorable discharge at its close. He was a member of the G. A. R. Post of this city and the only member who was a Nebraska soldier.

At the close of the war he united in marriage with Elizabeth Hughes who preceded him into the great beyond about seven years ago. To this union was born three sons, Frank, Amos and Edgar. The second son Amos died two years before his mother. The other sons still survive him and are engaged in business in this city.

Mr. Cowden cast his lot with the people of Red Cloud about twenty-five years ago engaging in the painter's trade serving his customers faithfully. About two years ago he ceased active labor and we now know that he did so because of the affliction which caused his death yet he never murmured or complained and even his nearest relatives and friends were unaware of the seriousness of his malady. He was always genial and had a kind word for everyone. He will be sadly missed by his associates who had learned to enjoy and appreciate his benevolent disposition. The funeral services were conducted at the home of his son Frank Saturday at 6:30 the Rev. A. A. Cressman officiating. The members of the G. A. R. attended in a body. Interment was made in the city cemetery.

L. A. Haskins

L. A. Haskins, pioneer and highly esteemed citizen has gone from our midst.
Lucian A. Haskins was born Oct. 4, 1850 in Onandaga County, New York. His worthy farmer parents led him into all the fine traits of the agriculturalists of old York state. When the subject of this sketch was eight years of age his parents removed with him to Juneau County, Wis. Here his education was completed as far as the common schools could lead him. On

reaching manhood's estate his spirit of energy led him into railway service for a number of years. The lure of the farm was not slighted and in 1878 he homesteaded valuable lands in Sheridan County, Kansas. In 1880 he entered Webster County, Nebraska with his family, and here he has lived and exerted the influence of his life as one of our citizens who sought to build up the broad expanse into a habitable and comfortable home community. He gave all who knew him examples in good farming, good stock and good citizenship. On Oct. 26, 1871 he married Miss Sophia Mahard, who is widowed by his demise and with their two sons William J. and Ernest L., and their daughter Mrs. Ella V. Hart, mourn his departure.

Mr. Haskins had the spirit of patriotism which early manifested itself. When only eleven years of age he lustily played the life in the martial strains that called the lovers of 'old glory' to her defense in the '60s, and it was his delight to assist with such patriotic music on national days and occasions. He removed from the farm and became a resident of our city in 1901, where he had the confidence of social and commercial circles ever widening. He espoused the Christian faith and was baptized by Elder L. A. Hussong. His love for the good, the true, the holy and godly was cheerfully and daily evidenced through many months of severe suffering occasioned by a sad combination of physical disorders. His death came on June 28, 1910, ending his life at the age of 59 years 8 months and 24 days. The funeral rites were conducted from the home by his pastor and attended by the M. W. A. in the march to our beautiful cemetery where the interment was made.

In the material realm the pencil of the historian may write 'finis'; but the power of a good man, an efficient citizen and a christian character combined never ceases till time shall merge into eternity and the last of our race shall depart to that mysterious bourne from whose portal the feet of the redeemed never turn earthward, but their spirits, melting into sweet accord with the Infinite, shall linger to worship and serve the Holy Father-God during measureless aeons eternal and blissful.

J. R. Harrington

James R. Harrington was born Aug. 11, 1849 in Columbia County, Penn. He was married in 1873 to Miss Maris Schouten and moved to Kansas in 1879. In 1895 they came to Nebraska and located in Webster County north of Red Cloud. He has six children living—four daughters and two sons, one daughter died in infancy.

Mr. Harrington has been suffering from dropsy for some time. Some three months ago he moved to this city to be near a physician, but he had to yield to the inevitable and died June 27th. at 7 p. m. Funeral services were conducted at the M. E. church Wednesday afternoon by the Rev. A. A. Cressman of the Congregational church. The community mourns with the family in this their hour of bereavement and loss.
