 Red Cloud**

Besides the relatives of an ex-governor, there lives there blood relations of Abraham Lincoln, Gen. Phil Sheridan, Gen. Joe Wheeler, Admiral Sampson and Buffalo Bill. Two families who claim direct lineage to the Pilgrims of the Mayflower. Also a few blood relations of Moses and Aaron and a few descendants of Cain. A whole host of relatives by marriage of Mathusalem. And those not included in any of these classes of great relationship are proud honest industrious descendants of Adam who earn their bread in the honest sweat of their faces because of the original sin. 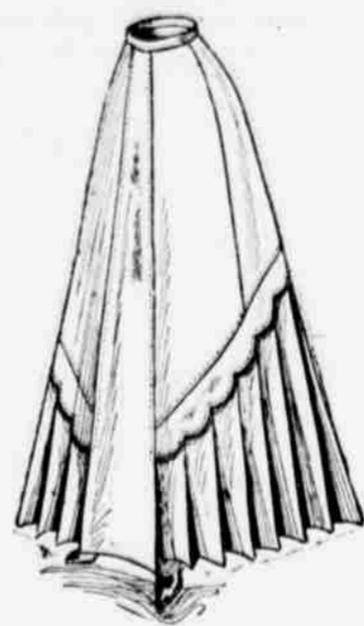

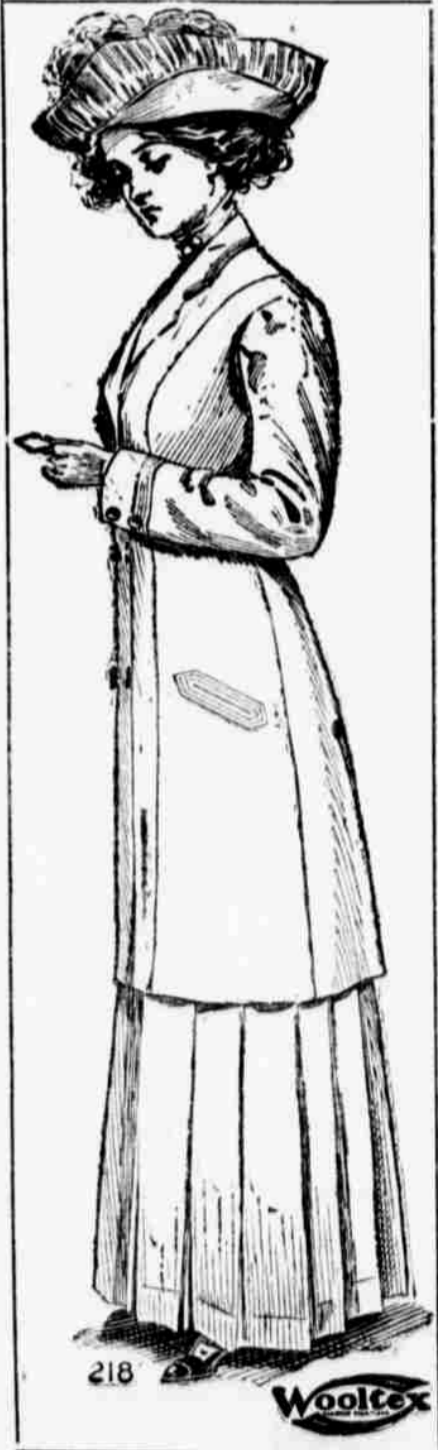
