Early in the spring we were told that the fruit crop was entirely destroyed but from indications all over this county we will have the biggest crop of apples that has ever been produced. It is estimated that this county alone will have two hundred thousand barrels of apples for sale.

Strange how time changes public sentiment. Only a few months ago the entire county was busy condemning the great Standard Oil monopoly but within the last few weeks a man by the name of Rockefeller has been making a campaign for the legislature down in Kansas and the people are flocking to his support by the hundreds.

We just read in an up to date farm paper that weeds were soil robbers. Now we can go after them with a vengeance. Before the weeding of the garden was sheer labor but now we are confident that the employment will be a pleasure for the western spirit of killing robbers still stave in our veins. This leads us to remark that the robbers in Red Cloud need killing before the Chautauqua begins. Respectfully submitted to the mayor and city council.

Some one with a little money and care could make a mint of money by establishing a cold storage plant here. If one half of the reports be true about the wealth made by cold storage plants a fortune awaits the man who has the enterprise to establish one here. We have no idea of the amount of butter and eggs that leave this city every year but it is sufficiently large to net a nice income to the man who will pack it away and hold for higher prices. We know that eggs in the summer sell for about twelve cents per dozen and we also know that in the winter time they reach thirty cents per dozen which represents a gain of eighteen cents. Allowing six cents for operating expenses would still leave a good profit of one hundred per cent.

Omaha politicians regardless of party seem to think that the city of breweries is the whole state of Nebraska. They carry things down there with a high hand but they do not forget to grab every thing possible for Omaha. If they only knew it they are doing themselves more harm than good. The time for bulldozing has passed and the quicker Omaha finds it out the better.

Bro. Hosmer has been laboring long and hard for an up town express and telegraph office and his efforts deserve encouragement. An office of that kind would be a wonderful convenience to our people and we ought to have it. There is a strong sentiment here for an uptown office and we suggest in order to get definitely to work, that some enterprising citizen get up a petition or request and have every one sign it and then turn it over to the railroad officials. Perhaps they do not know that we would welcome a change of that kind. At any rate we should be working for it and it will come. Everyone sign the petition and then let everyone write a personal letter asking that the petition be acted upon favorably.

There is one industry that seems to have been overlooked in this country and it is one that could be made quite profitable. We have reference to truck farming. We are so used to cultivating large acres of land that truck farming seems to have received but very little attention and yet larger returns can be realized from the truck farm than from many of the larger undertakings. The merchants have been criticized for shipping in early vegetables and fruits from the south and ruining the price of home grown materials and in a measure this criticism is just and yet no one has cared to go into this business very extensively and the merchant cannot depend upon anyone furnishing him with reasonable stock and hence must send off for it. If some one would undertake the responsibility of furnishing early vegetables and fruits we are confident that our merchants would only be too glad to purchase all that is raised. The system of forcing has been demonstrated to be practical and if practised here we could have green things to eat almost as soon as the southern growers.

**Democrats Meet at Blue Hill**

Indorse Governor Shallenberger and Name State Convention Delegates.

BLUE HILL, NEB., July 19.—The democrats of Webster county met in convention in the opera house at Blue Hill today. The meeting was called to order by L. C. Piesiger. E. H. Cox was elected chairman and George W. Hutchison secretary. The following delegates were elected to the state convention at Grand Island next Tuesday: Bernard McNeny, L. C. Piesiger, George W. Hutchison, C. B. Hale, O. R. Pittney, C. Fassler, George Koehler, Frank Delhoj, V. S. Hall, E. H. Cox, D. F. Jones, James Eggleston. E. H. Cox was elected as chairman of the county central committee and V. S. Hall secretary.

The following resolutions were adopted by the convention: "We, the democratic party of Webster county, reaffirm our position on the question of tariff reform and believe that the democratic party should continue the fight against protected monopolies.

We are opposed to county option and instruct our delegates to the state delegation to work for a platform declaring emphatically against this policy.

"We recommend the work of Senator Charles R. Besse in the last legislature and express to Senator Besse our thanks for the able and fearless manner in which he represented the people of this senatorial district.

We believe that the paramount issue in the campaign should be tariff reform.

"We heartily indorse the present democratic governor and his administration."

**BALL TEAM ARRAIGNED. Charged With Violating State Law on Sunday Ball.**

Seward, Neb., July 16.—The Red Cloud ball team was arraigned before Justice Gladwish yesterday to answer the charge of violating the state law with regard to playing ball on Sunday. The alleged offense was committed at Staplehurst on June 19, when a game was pulled off between Seward and Red Cloud. The case against the latter team was continued until August 20.

A like suit is pending against the home team, the trial of the same being set for July.—Sunday State Journal.

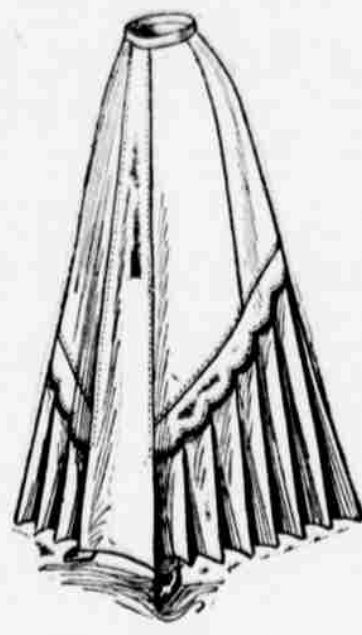
