ONDON .- The American season in London, Paris and Berlin is the best since the three golden years preceding the panic of 1907. The hotels of all the capitals of Europe are thronged with well-to-do Americans. who are spending money with the traditional lavishness that pleases the hotelkeepers and shopkeepers everywhere.

Europe has learned that not all Americans are millionaires, and so it is that less is heard each year of extortion and attempted extortion. American tourists, too, seem to have learned thrues to be the Mecca of Americans, the ropes and they know just where to go to get the most for their money.

Comfortable new hotels that charge reasonable prices have been built in all the capitals of Europe within the last five years and in Paris, London, Berlin, Rome and Vienna, new hotels invariably have many baths, while some that appeal to the wealthier visitors have suites with baths that are as modernly luxurious as anything New York and shopkeepers and restaurant keepcan offer. 
