Other farmers have learned other lessons and all should share in the knowledge. We expect a great deal this year from the farmers institute.

ADDITIONAL LOCALS

We have been driving over the country this week and had occasion to travel over some of the new roads which the commissioners are making. We must say that we are very much pleased. The old chalk hill south of this city which for so many years was a bugaboo has been eliminated and a magnificent road is now to be found there. Commissioner Hummel has been in charge of this road and he has certainly made good. A strip of land was purchased of J. Ellinger which permitted making the road around the hill. The steep slope has been leveled and two permanent cement curbs put in and anyone can haul as big a load as he chooses over this road.

Just west of town Commissioner Overman has supervised the rebuilding of that portion of the road which has hitherto defied the strength of teams especially during bad weather and now one of the best roads in the county is to be found there. Here also is installed one of those permanent bridges, the hills have been leveled and the road is fit for a king. Farmers will now be able to get in and out of Red Cloud.

Our tennis club went to Cowles last Friday and played a match game with the lovers of that game there. We received many different stories of the result of the games. Some of our players insisted that Cowles had won owing to the fact that they won the most games. On the other hand some of our players declared that Red Cloud was entitled to the honors because they had won the most sets. This mixed us all up.
