The Water Problem Again

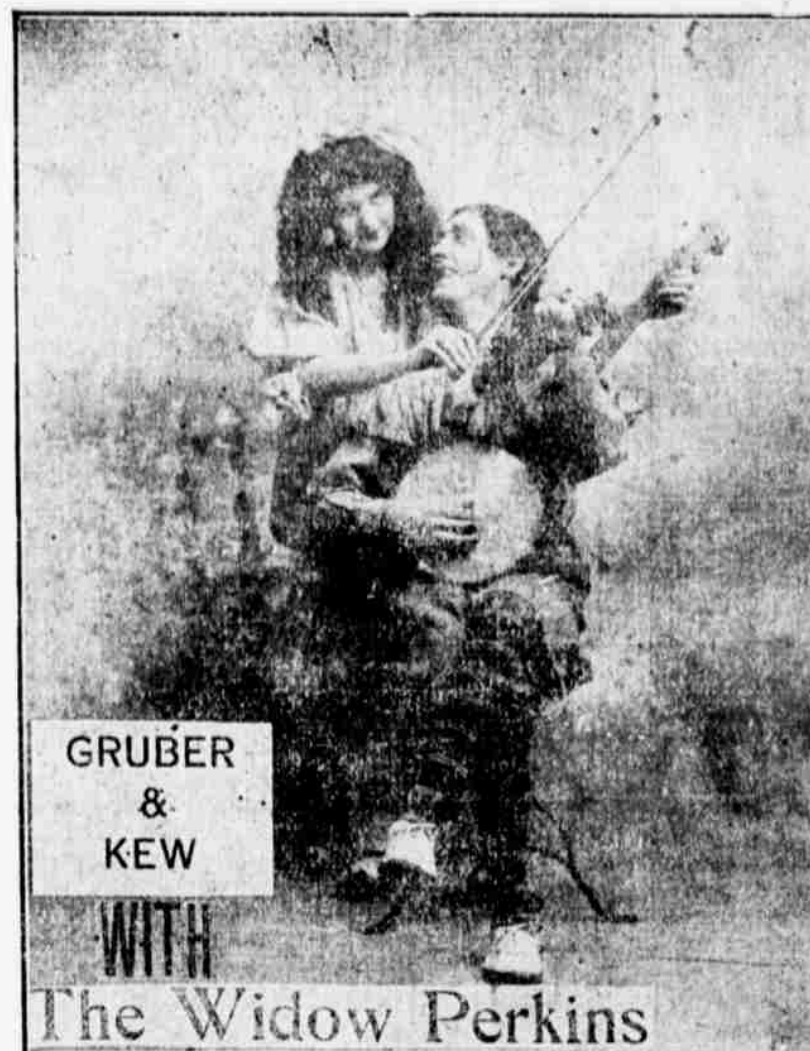
Yesterday morning there was a hurry call for the citizens to meet in the council chamber to once again determine what should be done with the ever present water problem. This meeting was called by Dr. Cook who had been up to the power plant and found that work on the extension ditch had been stopped owing to a rupture between the council and mayor. He affirmed his belief and faith in the present ditch and offered to back up his judgement with a donation to the city of \$500. Everyone admired the Doctor for his generosity but no one seemed disposed to allow private funds to be expended for public service. Superintendent Rich was asked to explain his findings in regard to piping the springs to the power house and he explained that he had given the matter careful consideration and had accurately estimated the expense necessary to bring the springs down and that \$5,000.00 would be ample. By using an eight inch pipe to start with and a six inch pipe for the remainder of the distance he could deliver the water to the intake of the water pump and by utilizing the force gained by 38 feet of fall could reduce the coal consumption twenty five per cent.

At this time the real difficulty between the council and mayor was presented. It seems from the records that the council entered into a contract with a man by the name of Nelson to employ him to dig a ditch, lay pipe and fill same. Work was to commence August 19th and be completed Sept. 19, 1910. Said Nelson did not appear until the 29th of September and the council informed him that the time had expired and that he should do no work. His contract was void. Mayor Potter took it upon himself to instruct the contractor to proceed with the work. All went well until he called upon the city to produce the tile necessary for the ditch and this the council refused to furnish. Mayor Potter claimed that he had received no notice of this special meeting of the council but the city records showed that a written notice had been left at his usual place of business and that the city clerk had notified the mayor of the meeting by telephone. An adjournment was then taken to four o'clock.

Promptly at that hour the citizens assembled in the commercial club rooms to further consider the problem. History repeated itself and all the theories were present as to faith in water being found somewhere in the neighborhood of the present system. Superintendent Rich again his findings as to the cost of piping the springs. Mayor Potter asserted that the present ditch was exactly the plan which Dr. Condra advocated when he visited this place last spring but it was conclusively shown that the plan as laid down by Dr. Condra was laid one side and the present plan substituted. Whereupon the mayor stated that he was under the impression that he had been following the original plan. As the letter of Dr. Condra was on file, a motion was made instructing the chair to appoint a committee of three to act with Superintendent Rich which committee was to determine whether or not the geologists ideas were being carried out.

At this time a motion was made to sound the opinion of those present as to whether they favored the extension of the present system or the piping of the springs and the vote resulted in twenty-seven for the springs and three against.

A committee was then appointed to present a petition to the council asking that bonds be voted to bring the springs down and forever settle this question.
