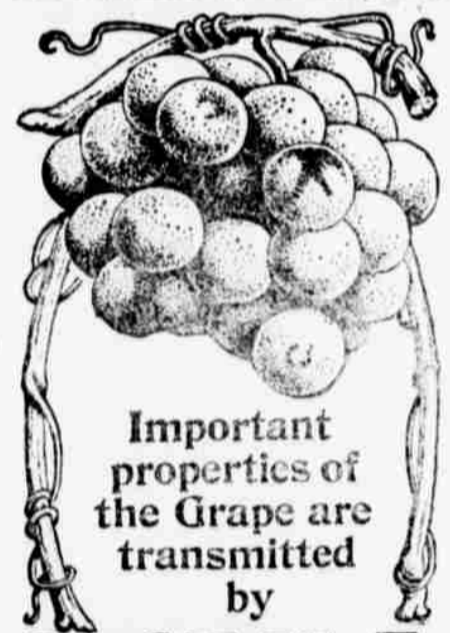

The Rushton Land Case
 The case of Rushton vs. Burke & Campbell and Carpenter occupied the first two days of the term. This case has been on the docket since January, 1907. It has been tried three times. The first time Judge Adams, without the aid of a jury, decided the case in favor of plaintiff. An appeal was taken to the supreme court, which reversed Judge Adams' decision on technical grounds.
 The cause was again tried before a jury which disagreed.
 At this term the jury gave the plaintiff a verdict for \$1,450 and interest from January, 1907.
 The facts in the case are substantially as follows: In the fall of 1906 Joshua Rushton accompanied Allen H. Carpenter to Imperial, Chase county, where he made a contract for the purchase of quarter section of land, paying \$1,450 down and agreeing to pay \$2,250 on the 20th day of January, 1907, when he was to receive a deed.
 Becoming convinced that he had been misled, he employed Attorney Bernard McNeny, who went to Imperial and rescinded the contract, and demanded the return of the \$1,450 paid.
 Without going into particulars, it is sufficient to say that the general sentiment approves the verdict rendered in the case, which returns Rushton's money to him.

Widow's Pension.
 The recent act of April 19th, 1908 gives to all soldiers' widows a pension of \$12 per month. Fred Maurer, the attorney, has all necessary blanks.
