Second Test of Springs. Superintendent's Estimate.

Acting upon our own advice of last week we again took the trouble to have a second test made of the Maurer springs in order to see if there was any change in the flow. This time there were members of the council and others present to see the test made. This figures will be found in the estimate as given by Superintendent Rich. The water is unquestionably there and those who have observed the springs for the last thirty years inform us that as far as could be told by the eye the flow has always remained constant. Here is the estimate as given by Superintendent Rich:

Now in order that there may be the fullest understanding and confidence we believe that it is the duty of the city council to secure a competent engineer to verify or disprove the findings of the above estimate. The citizens of Red Cloud are undoubtedly in favor of having good water and the public sentiment is strongly in favor of the springs but this water problem has arrived at the point where absolute knowledge is indispensable to the carrying out of the present proposition. We strongly favor having an outside engineer go over the estimate and conditions, give his findings impartially and then we believe that it would be for the best interest of the city to have the council adopt plans and specifications and ask for bids. If it were found that a contractor were willing to enter into an agreement to construct the pipe line and do all the labor for a given sum of money and that sum fell within the bounds of our available funds then there would be no question but that the bonds would be voted. There would be no valid objection so long as everybody had full knowledge of all the facts.

The question of individual beliefs or assurances must be relegated to the rear and nothing but hard facts backed up by a contract will satisfy the people who pay the taxes. The taxpayers are perfectly willing to foot the bills provided they can get the worth of their money. As we have expressed before so we express again our utmost confidence in our city officials and their ability to successfully handle this present undertaking yet we want them to present the facts fairly and squarely so that all may know just what they are doing.

There is another side to this question and that is the one of time. We do not believe in rushing a new idea thru without careful, serious consideration but neither do we favor unnecessary delays. It will take several months at least before this question can be presented to the voters for their judgement during which time there will be ample opportunity for the fullest discussion so that a beginning should be made at once. The time to strike is while the iron is hot. We believe that time is now. We seem to be waiting on this one undertaking let it be pushed to a successful conclusion.
