**INAVALD BANK ROBBED**

**SAFE AND BUILDING WRECKED**  
**Robbers get \$850 and Escape**

Friday night a gang of bank robbers looted the Bank of Inavale securing \$850.00 in cash. They used nitroglycerine to blow open the safe and the concussion of the explosion was so great as to break the windows in the buildings across the street. The safe was completely demolished. Sheriff Hedge was notified about two o'clock in the morning and immediately went to the scene of the robbery. He tracked the robbers to the White rock easily since they departed on foot. But here the trail was lost and the robbers escaped. They stopped at the McCall school house and there probably divided the money because papers belonging to the bank were found there. This gang came well prepared and carefully guarded the bank while the work was being done. We trust that they will be caught and given a term in the pen where they will have time to change their manner of living.

**City Buys a New Boiler and Stokers**

The city council met in regular session last night and after allowing a number of bills took up the question of installing another boiler at the power house. For some time it has been well known that a second boiler was badly needed but owing to the condition of the city finances the council did not feel warranted in making any extensive addition to the plant. However the state boiler inspector was here recently and practically informed the council that a new boiler must be installed or else the city would be compelled to suspend business. Fortunately for the city there was a large mill burned at Beatrice but which left a new boiler and two stokers intact. After considering carefully all the pros and cons the council bought this equipment for \$1750.00 which price is just one half what the material is worth. The company agrees to furnish fire insurance in inspection on the boiler after it is loaded on the cars.

We congratulate the city upon this saving. We will be better prepared than ever to successfully operate our plant.

The stokers alone will save \$1000.00 a year in the consumption of coal and another material saving will be effected by being able to keep the boiler fires clear. The action of the council will be highly satisfactory to all.

**History of Red Cross Seals**

Red Cross Christmas Seals date back in their origin to "charity stamps," first used for the soldiers' relief funds in Boston in 1862, during the Civil War. After the war, this method of raising money was discontinued in this country for a generation, although it found vogue in Portugal, Switzerland, Australia, France, Spain, Denmark, Norway, Russia, Sweden and other European countries. There are now several hundred different types of charity stamps used in all parts of the world.

Stamps or seals were first used to get money for the anti-tuberculosis crusade in Norway and Sweden in 1904. After being used in these countries for three years, as a direct result of the interest of Jacob Riis in this movement, the Delaware Anti-Tuberculosis Association, headed by Miss Emily P. Bissell, and the Red Cross Society of Delaware combined in issuing a Tuberculosis Stamp. So successful was this campaign that nearly \$3,000 was realized, and the next year, in 1908, the American Red Cross was induced to issue a National Red Cross Tuberculosis Stamp. From this sale, \$135,000 was realized, that amount being almost doubled in 1909. This year, for the first time, the sale is organized on a comprehensive basis, taking in all parts of the United States. A million for tuberculosis work is confidently expected.
