The agricultural schools are sending out warning to the farmers to see that their seed corn is kept in a dry place. Much depends upon the manner in which seed corn is handled and our farmers will do well by heeding the advice of these men who have conducted extensive experiments.

One of the measures to come up for consideration at the coming congress is the act to prevent the printing of envelopes by the government. It is argued by many that the government should continue in the business of printing and delivering envelopes for less money than any printer in the land can buy the blank envelopes for a number of banks and corporations being pledged to fight the bill. It is right for the government to print envelopes at cost why would it not be all right for Uncle Sam to loan money without interest, or to sell every article needed at cost. The government admits there is no profit in the envelopes furnished and that the transportation of the same all over the country free helps to make up the large deficit in the postal department. -Bloomington Advocate.

The appointment of a commissioner to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Overman should receive careful serious consideration. First of all we hold that a citizen of this city should be appointed. In this district there are three divisions, first and second ward and the township. For many years past the township has received the major share of the road fund and it is time that the tax payers of this city should receive some of their money back. Again the commissioner should be competent and efficient one who will take a real interest in the county affairs. All roads leading to this city should be kept in excellent condition. We would much prefer a conservative man for this position one who will carefully husband the county's resources. The man who have this appointment in charge have an excellent opportunity of rendering the county real service by selecting a man that is already experienced in business matters and who will give us a good careful, business administration.

The Omaha mothers held a meeting the other day to discuss ways and means of eliminating the expense connected with the graduation of their children. This question of dress during commencement week is far more serious than many suppose. In the first place there are people of means

who want their children to have the best of everything and they do not hesitate to procure all that is in the market. We have no complaint to make with this but there are other people who cannot afford expensive clothes for their children and they love them just as much as the people who are more well to do. The result is the children are either humiliated or else the parents are plunged into debt. The money which should have been spent for food and warm clothes is spent for show which is wrong. The Omaha board of education might learn a lesson from our board and require that all students shall appear in caps and gowns during commencement. We think that our board should go one step further and require the seniors to appear in the caps and gowns at all the functions connected with commencement. These gowns are fully as pretty and attractive as any of the hundred dollar dresses and the appearance of the class on the stage is much more harmonious.

The spirit of Jesse James still is abroad in the land if we may judge by the many bank robberies reported recently. While these robbers do not ride into town in broad day light and hold up the bankers they are yet as desperate and as bold. We have heard private citizens censured for not interfering with these burglars but the fact is that most of us would hesitate to attempt to stop four or five desperate men while they are engaged in cracking a safe. They would not hesitate to shoot and they would certainly shoot to kill. However it is a fact that if people would deliberately shoot from some secure place there would not be so many robberies. We believe that the law would certainly protect anyone who would use any means to checkmate outlawry of this kind. Officers of the law cannot be in all places at all times and if the citizens would take it upon themselves to assist at critical times criminals would be more careful and would not be so high handed. Another thing which keeps these men going is that but a small percent of bank robbers are ever caught and convicted. Uncle Sam will go to any expense and trouble to reach and convict any violators of his revenue laws and it seems to us that he ought to be just as zealous in prosecuting men who rob and kill.
