The American Red Cross and that connected with most of the foreign countries, as you undoubtedly know, stands ready to render aid in time of war, pestilence, famine, earthquake, or other disasters. Since the growth of the Tuberculosis Movement they have devoted a certain percentage of their income to what they term peace campaign or the fight against tuberculosis. This effort is centered around the holiday season when for the last four years they have issued a sticker or stamp, to be sold at one cent each, a certain proportion to remain with the agency undertaking the distribution of these stickers, and a certain proportion being rendered to the Red Cross to pay them, not only for the printing and distribution of the stickers, stamps or seals, as they are known this year, but also for all of the display and advertising matter which they furnish along with the seals. Last year they began by exacting 33 1/2 per cent, but found they could reduce it to 20 per cent late in the season. This year they are exacting only 12 1/2 per cent, so that 87 1/2 per cent of gross proceeds from the sale of these seals remains in the state of Nebraska for the prosecution of Anti-Tuberculosis work.
