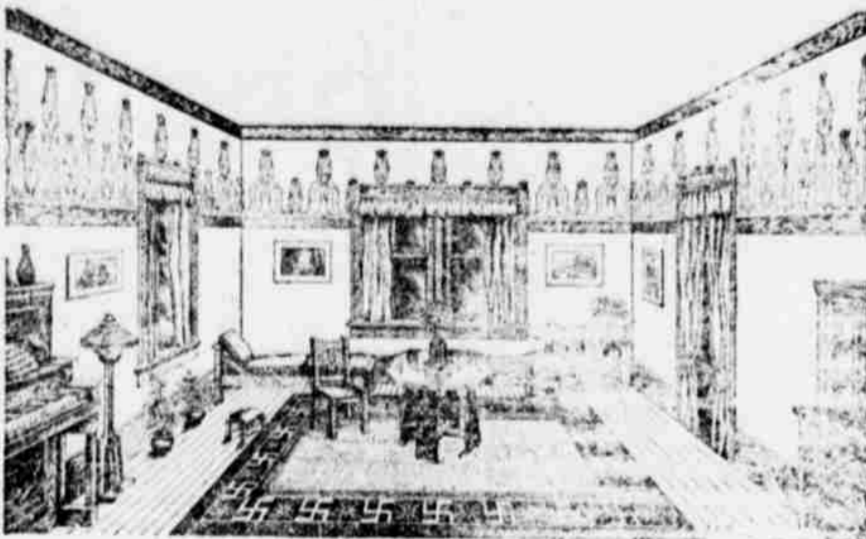

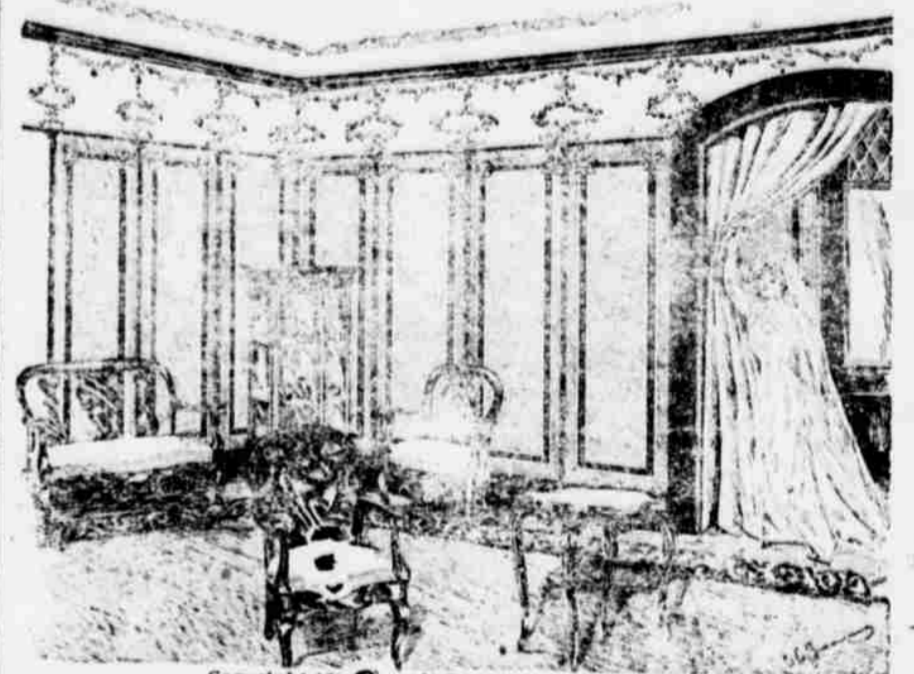

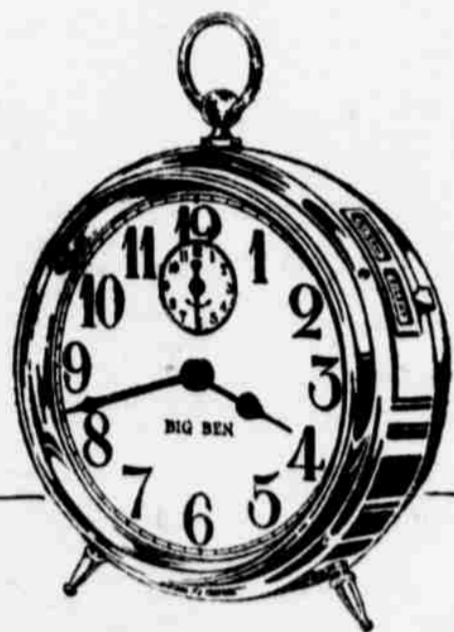

In the matter of the Estate of Courtland C. Cowden, Deceased.

Order of Hearing And to Show Cause.

On this 25th day of November 1910, Petitioners Frank W. Cowden and Edgar H. Cowden filed their petition herein, alleging the death of Courtland C. Cowden, intestate, on June 25, 1910 and praying that regular Administration of the estate of said deceased be opened with, for an adjudication of heirship in the premises, and that they be adjudged the sole surviving heirs at law of said decedent, that said decedent died intestate while an inhabitant of Webster County, that all his debts and funeral expenses have been paid and that the following real property, to-wit: Lots 16, 17, and 18 in Block 8 in Smith & Moore's Addition to Red Cloud, in Webster County, Nebraska, constituted the homestead of said decedent, and is wholly exempt from execution, attachment or other process and not liable for the debts of the decedent, and for such other and further relief as the circumstances of the case may require.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED hereby that said petition be heard before the County Court of said County, at the Court House on the 16th day of December 1910, at 10 o'clock a. m., at which time all persons interested in said estate may appear and show cause why the prayer of said petition should not be granted; and that notice of said petition and hearing be given by the publication of this order for three successive weeks prior to said hearing in the Red Cloud Chief, a legal newspaper published in said county.
