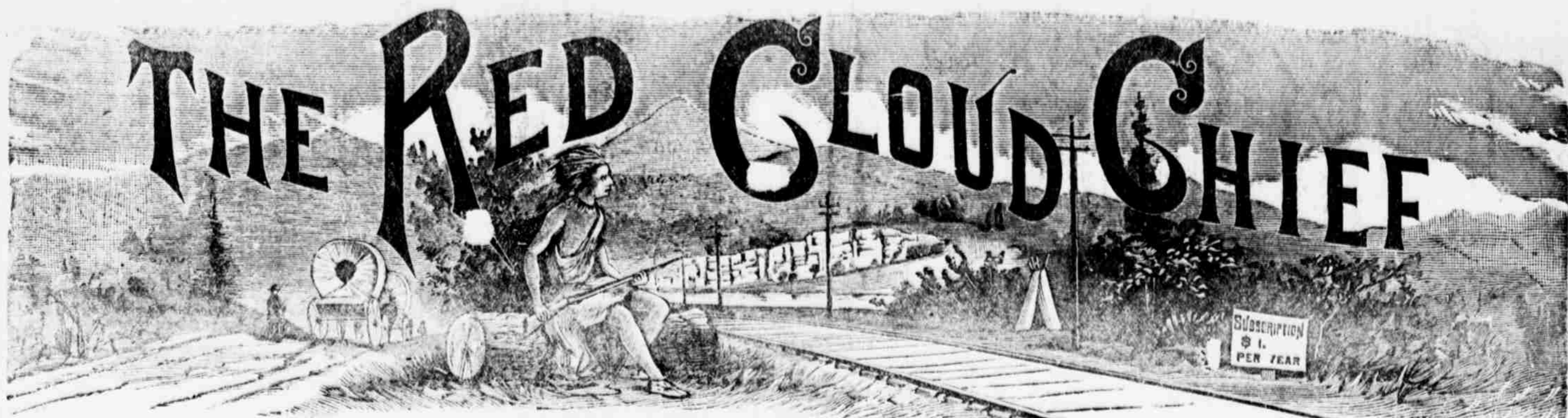

Nebraska Bank Guaranty Law Upheld By U. S. Supreme Court.
And Similar Laws Kansas and Oklahoma Are Also Declared to Be Constitutional.

Governor Shallenberger Much Pleased—Says It is a Great Democratic Day—Bankers Non-Committal.

Washington, D. C., Jan 3.—The fight against the state guaranteeing bank deposits met with reverses today when the supreme court of the United States held constitutional the bank guaranty laws of Kansas, Oklahoma and Nebraska.

The three acts were passed by the respective state legislatures as a result of the financial stringency beginning in 1907. They were similar except that the Nebraska law made it obligatory on all state banks to contribute to the guaranty fund to be placed in the hands of state officials, while the Oklahoma and Kansas legislatures left the contribution with attendant duties and benefits to the discretion of the banks themselves.

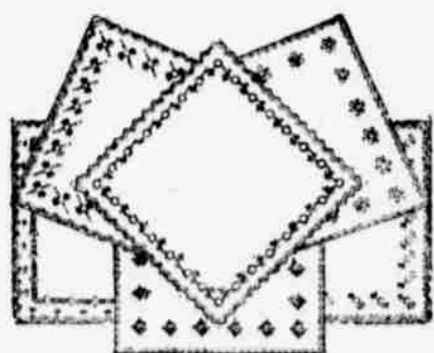
The supreme court of Oklahoma held that the law was constitutional; so did the circuit court of the United States for the district of Kansas in passing on the Kansas law. The circuit court of the United States for the district of Nebraska held the Nebraska law unconstitutional.

H. W. Yates, president of the Nebraska National, when asked if any national banks would throw up

their charters and become state banks to avail themselves of the guaranty law, said he could not say. He thought, however, that the decision would not make much difference.—World Herd.

Thus it will be seen that the fight for state bank guarantee two years ago has borne fruit. In that campaign the Democratic party went on record endorsing the policy in the state platform. The people endorsed the policy by electing a Democratic legislature, and that Democratic legislature made good. We have good reason, therefore, to crow loudly and lustily. The Democratic party can be trusted to redeem its platform pledges. This bank guarantee law is a just and righteous measure and is not opposed by the banks. In fact, most of them have expressed the desire that some way might be opened whereby speculative banks could be eliminated. One per cent reserve is made necessary to protect depositors.

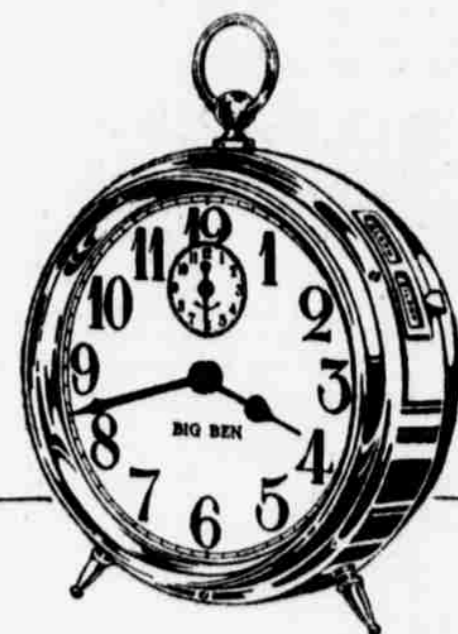
