Notice of Incorporation.

Notice is hereby given that a corporation has been formed by the undersigned and articles of incorporation executed and recorded. The name of the incorporation is The Nebraska and Kansas Telephone Company of Red Cloud, Nebraska. The general nature of the business to be transacted is the constructing, buying, owning, leasing, acquiring, operating and selling telegraph and telephone lines and central office in said city of Red Cloud and the surrounding country and other places in the state of Nebraska and adjoining states; the making of exchanges and exchange agreements with other lines and companies, and in general to carry on for hire the business of transmission of news and messages, local and long distance, and to acquire, hold and dispose of such property, real and personal, as may be deemed expedient in the conduct of the business.

The capital stock authorized is \$100,000.00, divided in shares of \$50.00 each, to be issued one share to each signer of the preliminary incorporation agreement for each "phone share" now held by them respectively in the original association known as The Lebanon Telephone Line and the remaining shares to be treasury stock to be disposed of for the benefit of the company as the directors may determine. The corporation shall commence business on the 10th day of January, 1911, and continue during a period of fifty years. The highest amount of indebtedness to which the corporation shall at any time subject itself is \$200,000. The affairs of the corporation are to be conducted by a board of directors not exceeding five in number.

south of the north line of said Pleasant Hill precinct, the said line extending through the center of section 23, town 2, range 10, east and west. The south part of said division shall retain the old name of Pleasant Hill precinct and the voting place shall be at Pleasant Hill school house, and the north part of said division shall be given the name of Cowles precinct, and the voting place of Cowles precinct shall be in Cowles village, and the present officers in Pleasant Hill precinct hold their offices in the territory in which they live. Motion carried.

In the matter of the county expenses for the ensuing year, it was moved and seconded that the following estimate of said expenses be approved, viz: For county superintendent, \$1500; for county court, \$500; for incidentals, \$500; for books and stationery, \$250; for corner, \$200; county commissioners, \$250; county attorney, \$1200; for county assessor and deputies, \$2500; jail and jailer, \$300; county board of equalization, \$300; county roads, \$20,000; county elections, \$1800; county poor, \$1000; county bridges, \$25,000; county railroad bonds, \$5000; soldiers' relief fund, \$500; county insurance fund, \$1000; total estimated expenses for year 1911,

\$70,700. Motion carried.

On motion, board adjourned to January 13, 1911.

January 13, 1911. Board met pursuant to adjournment; members all present. It was moved and seconded that the sealed bids for printing, as filed by the several firms as follows for consideration, viz: H. E. Grice Drug Co., bid of Red Cloud Commercial Advertiser, bid of Hastings Daily Republican of Hastings, Nebr.; bid of York Blank Book Co., of York, Nebr. After due consideration of the said bids it was moved and seconded that the bids be disposed of as follows: H. E. Grice Drug Co.'s bid for stationery for class "C" was accepted for the ensuing year. It was moved and seconded that the Commercial Advertiser's bid for class "B," legal blanks; class "D," letter-heads, tax list, treasurer's semi-annual report and other legal notices as per its bid now on file in the clerk's office be and the same is hereby accepted. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that other bids be and are hereby rejected. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that the several county officers have the privilege to order their supplies other than are included in the H. E. Grice Drug Co.'s bid and the Commercial Advertiser's bid wherever they can purchase said supplies to the best advantage as to price and quality of supplies purchased. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that the several county officers, whether purchasing their supplies at home or abroad, shall file a duplicate of such purchase in the purchase book kept on file in the clerk's office for that purpose. Motion carried.

Now comes Chas. Gurney and makes complaint that he has been damaged in the sum of \$28, caused by grading up the road on the south side of section 21, town 2, range 11, which causes a pocket or reservoir covering about two acres of his land with no outlet for the surplus water which collects on said land after a heavy rain and thereby damaged about two acres of corn to the extent of said sum of \$28 and requests the board to allow him damages in the sum of \$28. Moved and seconded that the above claim for damages be and is hereby allowed and the clerk be and is authorized and instructed to draw a warrant on the general fund in payment of the same. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that the County Clerk be, and is hereby, authorized and instructed to advertise for sealed bids for one year to do concrete work per cubic foot, county to furnish all material on ground, said bids to be filed with the County Clerk on or before noon February 11, 1911. Motion carried.

Now comes Dr. E. A. Boles and makes complaint that he was erroneously assessed on his personal property for the year 1910 in the sum of \$130 assessed value, and requests the board to reduce the assessed value on his personal property for the said year 1910 from \$330 to \$200.

It was moved and seconded that the above and foregoing request of Dr. E. A. Boles be and is hereby granted, and the county treasurer be and is hereby instructed and authorized to reduce the assessed valuation of Dr. E. A. Boles for the year 1910 from \$330 to \$200, thereby reducing his taxes from \$29.09 to \$18.42. Motion carried.

In the matter of the double assessment of personal property of John Wittwer consisting of pump stuff, etc., which was assessed in the State of Kansas, Logan township, and assessed in Webster county, Neb., the assessed value of said personal property being \$75, on which he has paid the taxes for the year 1910 in Kansas, which is his place of residence, and not wishing to pay taxes twice in the same year on the same property, he respectfully requests the board to have the taxes on said property struck from the tax book of Webster county for said year 1910. It was moved and seconded that the above and foregoing request be granted, and the county treasurer be and is hereby instructed to strike the taxes levied on said assessed valuation, \$75, against John Wittwer in Line precinct, Webster county, Neb., from the tax list of 1910.
