## Anti-gift Bill is a Law.

An Act to Prevent Gift Enterprises and to provide punishment for a violation of the same:

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Nebraska:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to engage in any gift enterprise in this state. Every person who shall sell or offer for sale any real-estate or article of merchandise of any description whatever, or any ticket of admission to any exhibition or performance, or other place of amusement, with a promise, expressed or implied, to give or bestow or in any manner hold out the promise of gift or bestowal, of any article or thing for and in consideration of the purchase by any person of any other article or thing, whether the object shall be for individual gain or for the benefit of any institution of whatever character, or for any purpose whatever, shall be held to be engaged in a gift enterprise within the provisions of this act.

Section 2. Any person or persons who shall engage in any gift enterprise in this state shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding five hundred dollars, or imprisoned in the county jail not exceeding six months, or both, at the discretion of the court.

Section 3. Whereas an emergency exists, this act shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage and approval.

All merchants or other businesses, who are giving away premiums, or who are giving discount slips for cash or any other article or money will be compelled to discontinue such manner of getting business at once, as they are liable to prosecution under this act from now on for a violation of the same. Those giving premiums away with baking powder, or any other article of merchandise, confectionery, or any other kind of business are liable under this provision. The Chief publishes the law this week that all may understand its provisions and judge their actions accordingly.

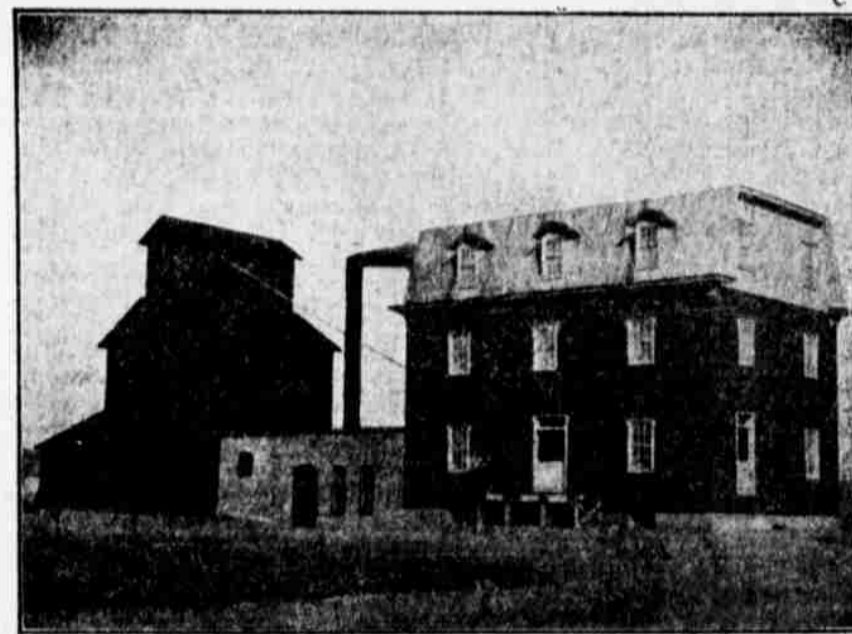
