NEW LAWS.

(Additional Review on Last Page.) GIFT ENTERPRISES PROHIBITED

House Roll No. 107, by Housh Makes it unlawful to engage in any sell or offer for sale real estate, articles of merchandise or ticket of admission to any place of amusement with a promise, expressed or implied, any other thing of value, either for private gain or for the benefit of any institution.

Penalty a fine of not to exceed \$500 or a jail sentence not to exceed six months or both

SMOKING FOR MINORS.

House Roll No. 313, by Quackenbush and Dolezal-Makes it unlawful for any minor under the age of 18 to smoke cigaretts or cigars or use tobacco in any form. Provides that such minor may be fined in any sum up to \$10 for violation, Provides further that he shall be free from prosecution, when he shall give evidence against the person selling or giving him tobac-

COUNTY ATTORNEY'S

Senate File No. 37, by Tibbetts Amends section 9548 Cobbey's Statutes. Makes more definite the duties of the county attorney, enjoins him to prosecute "felonies and misdemeanors" instead of "crimes" as in the old section, and requires him to "prepare, sign, verify and file" complaints instead of 500 just to "file."
