Some of the Laws Passed by the Last
Legislature.

ROADS AND BRIDGES.

STATE BRIDGE AID.

House Roll No. 274, by Cronin—Pro-
vides a one fifth mill levy to aid coun-
ties in the construction of bridges as
follows:

The state board of irrigation is con-
stituted the state board of supervision
for bridges.

Any county board may make applica-
tion for aid in the construction of
any bridge across any stream, 475 feet
or more wide. Such application shall
set forth the estimated cost of the pro-
posed bridge and a resolution of the
county board pledging the county to
stand half the cost of the bridge. Bids
are to be asked jointly by the county
and state and sent to the county clerk
of the county to be opened by the
clerk and a representative of the state
board.

The state is not liable for any cost
above the amount of the levy. Applica-
tions to be taken up by the state
board in the order of their filing.

The cost of maintenance is to be
borne by the county up to \$100 a year.
When such cost exceeds that amount
the state is to bear half the cost of the
excess.

In effect July 7, 1911.

STRENGTH OF BRIDGES.

House Roll No. 661, by Gustafson—
Provides that county boards, town
and officials having in charge bridge
construction and repair work shall
provide when such bridges are construct-
ed, reconstructed or repaired, for
flooring heavy enough to carry a load
of not less than twenty tons. The
floor of culverts must not extend above
the road way and bridges shall be con-
structed in a straight line with the
roadway, wherever possible.

Effective July 7, 1911.

WORK DONE BY THE COUNTY.

H. R. 34, by Fuller—Provides that
county boards may build or construct
bridges up to a cost of \$500 by employ-
ing day labor and without letting a
contract for the work, provides for
maintaining a detailed record of such
work. Amends Section 6126, Cobbe's.
Emergency. Now in effect.

COUNTY ROAD ORGANIZATION.

House Roll No. 670, by Joint Com-
mittee—One of set of road bills indors-
ed by Nebraska Good Roads association

amended to provide for an optional
county road organization, to be deter-
mined by the county board.

In counties over 50,000 population
the county surveyor shall be county
highway commissioner. In counties
of less population the county board
may appoint a highway commissioner
who may be the surveyor, but who
must be a practical road engineer.
The county board and county highway
commissioner is given exclusive auth-
ority over the roads of the county.
Precinct and township road super-
visors shall perform their work under
supervision of the board and commis-
sioner.

County road and bridge records are
to be kept containing full detailed in-
formation concerning all highways.
Each bridge must be labeled with a
sign showing the weight it will carry.
The first of each year the commis-
sioner must file a report showing full
detailed information of all work done
and material used the preceding year
and giving estimates and recommenda-
tions for the ensuing year. The com-
missioner cannot be interested in any
county contract.

Provision is made for keeping weeds
cut and for periodically dragging any
roads at a cost not to exceed \$1 a mile.
Emergency. In effect April 10, 1911.

CLAIMS FOR DAMAGES.

House Roll No. 64, by Gandy—Pro-
vides that claims for damages of right
of way of any public road and for ser-
vices of road officials shall be paid
from that county general fund. Formerly
they were paid from the road dis-
trict fund. Amends section 6150,
Cobbe's.
Effective July 7, 1911.

LAYING OUT ROADS.

Senate File No. 377, by Hoagland—
Empowers county boards to lay out
public roads where it is impracticable
to follow section lines. Where such
roads run through fenced private
lands the county board may furnish
automatic gates. For leaving a gate
open there is a maximum penalty of a
fine of \$50 or thirty days imprison-
ment.
Effective July 7, 1911.

LIVE STOCK

HOG CHOLERA SERUM

H. R. 58, by Sanborn—Provides for
the establishment at the state farm of
a plant for the production and prepa-
ration of hog cholera serum, the
work to be done by the department of
animal pathology. Serum is to be dis-
tributed by the department to farmers
and swine growers and to the state
veterinarian at actual cost. An ap-
propriation of \$15,000 is made for
carrying out the provisions of the act.
Receipts from the distribution of
serum shall be turned back into the
fund to continue the production, of
more serum.
Effective July 7, 1911.

GLANDERED HORSES

House Roll No. 177, by Dolezal and
Gustafson—Provides for indemnifica-
tion of owners of infected horses and
mules killed by order of the state vet-
erinarian. Appropriates \$25,000 for
the purpose. In no case shall the
amount paid exceed two-thirds the
value of the animal killed or be more
than \$200. Bringing an infected ani-
mal into the state is made a misde-
meanor, punishable by a fine of from
\$100 to \$1,000. Amends sections 3187,
3189 and 3190 Cobbe's.
Effective July 7, 1911.

THROWING BROKEN GLASS

House Roll No. 444, by Puls and
Stebbins—Prohibits throwing on any
public road, bridge, street or alley any
glass, crockery, tacks, nails, or any
sharp or broken substance which may
injure any person, animal or vehicle.
Punishable by a fine of from \$5 to
\$100.
Emergency. Now in effect.

COLUMBUS DAY A HOLIDAY

S. F. 291 by Burman—Amends Sec.
195, Chap. 41, Wheeler's compiled stat-
utes. Adds to the list of legal holidays
October 12, to be known as "Columbus
Day."
Emergency. In effect April 7, 1911

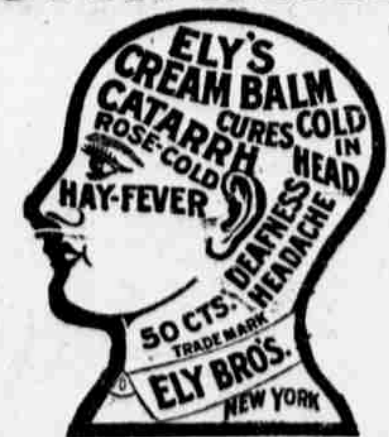
