What our Postmaster and his Assistants have to do for 30 days.

Complying with the recent regulation of the department Postmaster Hacker has been keeping count of the number of pieces of mail he has handled during the past week. In all there have been 27,620 separate pieces of mail during the first seven days. The rural routes handled the following number of pieces: Route 1, 1461; Route 2, 1268; Route 3, 1600; Route 4, 2364. Some of these articles are handled as high as seven times. Not only must Mr. Hacker count each piece of mail but he must keep a record of the time it takes him to perform the separate duties of his office. This rule will be in force for three weeks more. This extra work is no doubt very trying and takes up a great deal of time but so far Mr. Hacker has kept his temper and meets his customers with just as cordial a greeting as ever.
