On last Thursday, pursuant to a call of the chairman and secretary of the Democratic county central committee, the Democrats of Webster county met in mass convention at Blue Hill. E. H. Cox and Vaughn Hall, both of Bladen, were elected chairman and secretary, respectively. There was a good turnout, and many precincts of the county were represented. Various measures were discussed for the advancement of the party. The following resolutions

were adopted: "We, the Democrats of Webster county, assembled for the purpose of determining how we can elect our county ticket at the coming election,

"Resolve, that we are in favor of a fair distribution of the candidates to be nominated by our party, as to location in the county, and request the Democrats at the coming primary election to nominate candidates for the various offices from different parts of the county.

"We are opposed to one community attempting to obtain all the nominations. We request the Democrats of the northern part of the county to bring out candidates for some of the various offices.

"We are opposed to the primary law in its present condition.

"We hereby declare that we believe that hereafter the Democrats should meet in convention and nominate a ticket equally distributed over the county, and to that end we request that in the future no person file for any office on the Democratic ticket until such convention is held.

"We request that in the coming election every Democrat do his utmost for the election of our ticket."
