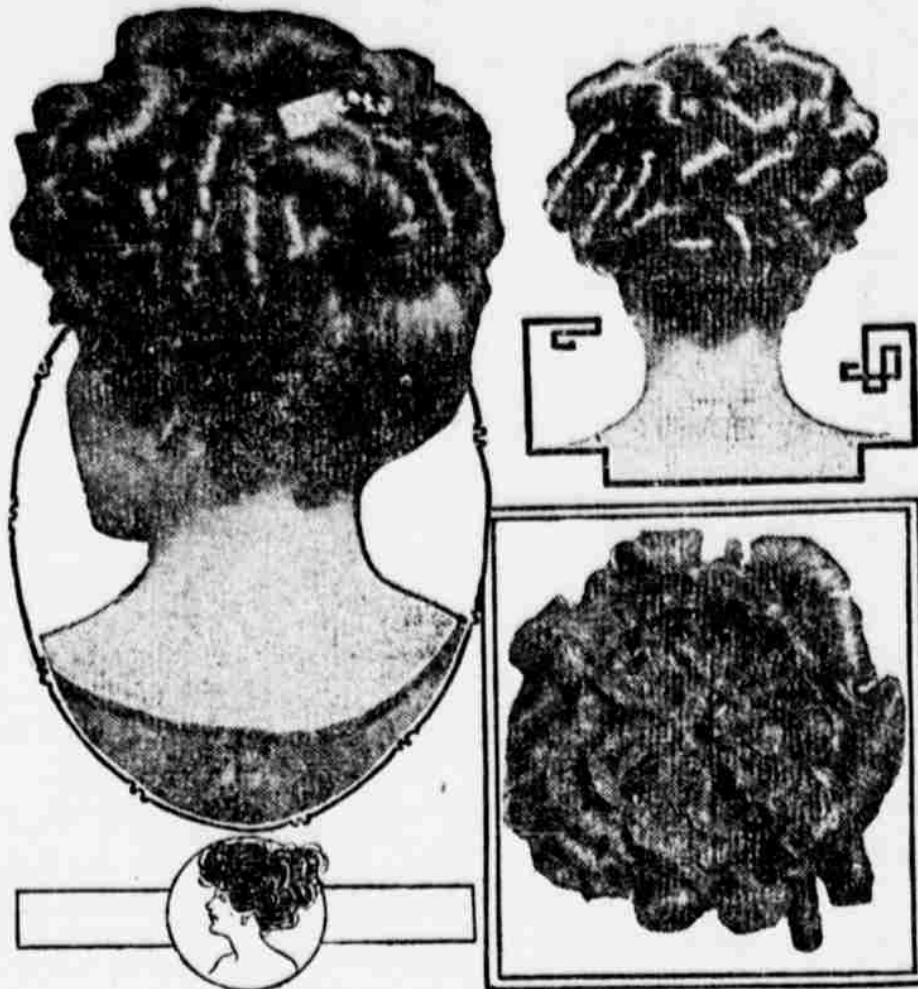

Suit Coiffure to Hat



If it is true (as those who make it their business to know, say it is) that American women have less hair than the women of other lands, then we are compelled to admire the cleverness with which they conceal this deficiency. One would naturally infer that a variety of styles in hairdressing would be impossible to them, but this is not the case at all. By using switches, chignons, transformations and the many other devices of dealers in hair goods, all the pretty conceits in the changing fashions in coiffure are copied and our gentlemen continue to look today demure, tomorrow vivacious; another day finds them with a stately coiffure and then again they effect simplicity. No doubt Cleopatra rung all the changes within her knowledge or invention in matters of dress to aid her in earning the greatest tribute paid to her fascinations: "Age cannot wither, nor custom stale, her infinite variety."

Just now we must concern ourselves with suiting our coiffures to both large and small hats. The new imports for midsummer are more than large, one may almost call them enormous. The large hats require a coiffure designed to fill in the space under the brim next the face and head, otherwise they look grotesque and

their beauty is wasted. The small hats require only enough hair visible about the face to frame it, but it is necessary to have a coiffure under the hat, for the hat must be taken off.

The puffed chignon shown in the picture is woven in a long strip like that used for a "transformation." This strip is drawn together at intervals leaving quite large spaces on the under side of the coiffure, which are covered by the puffs and curls on the outside. These open spaces afford ventilation, and they also make it possible to arrange the chignon in a great variety of styles. What with them and the hair bands now universally worn there is no end to the variety of coiffures that fashion makes possible.

The chignon placed high on the head so that it is in the crown of the hat solves the problem of the small turban and makes a stately and beautiful coiffure. The puffs are crowded together a little and pinned down over a coil of the natural hair (or two coils) placed on top. Usually no other support is needed for this coiffure. In case the natural hair is very thin a small pompadour may be arranged by using a small hair roll before the chignon is pinned to place.—Julia Bottomley in the Illustrated Milliner.

HEADGEAR FOR THE MOTOR

Attractive in Design and Affords Ample Protection Against the Flying Dust.

Here is a very attractive way of arranging headgear for motoring. The vieux rose straw shape is wound with a blue silk scarf, which terminates in



a loose chou at the side. A rose silk fringe frames the face and a chiffon veil of the same color is gathered on to the crown, to be thrown back off the face if preferred. No pins at all are required, except for fixing the bonnet on the head.

Ribbon Holder.

Cut four three and one-half inch circles out of thin cardboard, tack Dresden silk on one, and white soft silk on the other, being careful that it is on smoothly. Trim off all superfluous ends and sew the circles together firmly. Whip a tiny valenciennes lace on the edge of these and repeat the process with the remaining circles. When this is done insert a bolt of baby ribbon between them, and with a stiletto make two holes from top circle through bolt and bottom circle. In these insert a short piece of baby ribbon, tying in bow on top and in this bow put a bow ribbon threader.

TUB DRESSES FOR A DOLLAR

Dainty Frocks in All Sorts of Designs Are Now Well Within the Reach of All.

It is astonishing how many dainty frocks for the summer can be made these days setting the limit of expenditures at \$1, including the patterns and threads.

Never before have so many delicate designs been shown in inexpensive lawns and ginghams, and the business girl should begin now to make the smart little dresses which she will wear to the office during the coming summer.

Two things should be remembered. One is that much trimming of any sort detracts both from the cool effect of the gown and makes it bad to launder; the second is that however dainty the very light materials are they are far less serviceable than a plaid or a plain buff or blue dress.

As to the question of expense, begin with the pattern. Choose one of the new ones that are capable of being carried out in several different fashions, with or without the high waist line or with long or short sleeves and with or without yoke. Thus for 15 cents you will provide yourself with a pattern for several frocks.

Next, a few yards of white mull and some inexpensive lace will make broad collars and cuffs and a fichu or a dainty pointed yoke, all of which will serve as trimming, for your gowns.

Then as to materials. Ginghams, plain ones, may be purchased as low as 8 and 10 cents a yard. A good quality of lawn in dark colors is only a cent or two more in price.

Coat Hanger.

When away from home one very seldom thinks of taking a coat hanger along, but to prevent the coat from becoming creased and untidy looking by being thrown over the back of a chair an emergency coat hanger may be readily made. Roll a newspaper tightly and tie it in the middle with a stout cord, forming a loop to attach it to a hook or nail. This is better than throwing the coat limply in a nearest place, and is contrived in a minute with the materials always at hand.

Patch Quilts.

The housewife who has a patch quilt tucked away in some trunk in the attic will do well to bring it from its hiding place and spread it on the bed in her guest room this spring. If the real antique quilt is not available, then the making of one, piecing the squares together and stitching them, is a pleasant pastime.

CRADLE OF CONGRESS

Building Where Sat the First Senate and House.

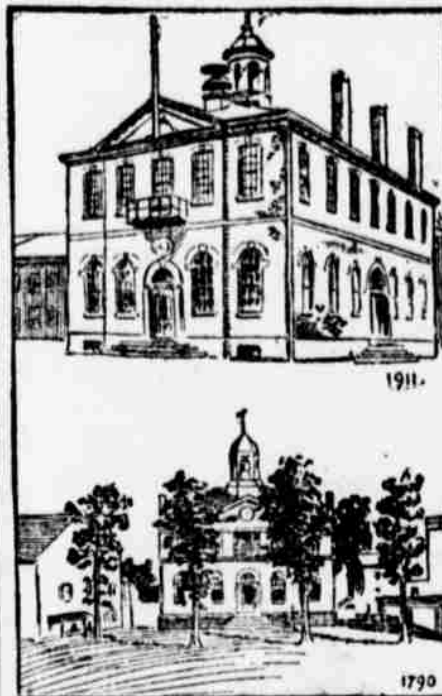
Congress Hall, Philadelphia, as It Is Today and as It Was in 1790—Where Washington Was Inaugurated.

Philadelphia, Pa.—After 16 years of neglect or of futile attempts to start work, the Philadelphia city government has finally appropriated \$50,000 for the restoration of Congress hall located at Sixth and Chestnut streets, and for the erection of memorial lamps in Independence square.

The first of the more recent attempts to restore the historic structure was made in 1893 by the Colonial Dames, who spent a great deal of time and considerable money to place the old senate chamber in the hall in approximately the same condition it was in a century before. The work was completed and a reception held to commemorate the work in 1896. And that ended all work on the old building for another decade.

About eight or nine years ago another piece of restoration was undertaken. The entrance on Sixth street was bricked up to make the exterior of the building coincide with its earlier design. This patriotic work was not without its comic aspect, for in bricking up the entrance the stairway leading to the restored senate chamber was cut off and since 1902 access to the historic chamber has been barred to all.

Since that time there has been a continual hue and cry to have the old building restored to its pristine condition as far as possible and a commit-

tee from the Philadelphia chapter of the American Institute of Architects has been collecting the necessary data from which to base the proposed restoration. The architects literally have had to feel their way. They have consulted historians, old magazines and even an old caricature which contains the only known view of the interior of the house of representatives. Walls and partitions have been torn down partially in the hope of gaining knowledge as to their original construction, but there have been so many changes that the work has been a gigantic puzzle. The architects, however, believe that now they possess data from which it will be possible to reconstruct the interior of the building as it was when Washington was president.

Back in 1762 Pennsylvania, then a province, acquired the land for the purpose of erecting there a building in which to hold courts. Not till 1785, after Pennsylvania had become a state, was money appropriated for the erection of a building, but the actual work was not begun till a later date. In 1787 the lot was enlarged and convicts were put to work excavating. The building was completed in March, 1789.

While the building was in course of erection the question of changing the seat of national government came up. New York, Baltimore and Philadelphia were bidders and the latter city strongly laid before congress the advantages of the new building. With this end in view the building was completed, not as intended with rooms for courts and civil officers, but with one general room occupying the entire ground floor for the house of representatives, and on the second floor a senate chamber and rooms for the vice-president and other officers.

Congress moved to Philadelphia in 1790 and occupied the building, since known as Congress hall, for the next ten years, when the capital was removed to Washington.

After the removal of congress the building for many years was used as a court building, for the district court of Pennsylvania and the court of common pleas. The last court was removed from the building in 1895 and for a few years thereafter it was occupied by part of the law school of the University of Pennsylvania.

The exterior of the building will not need to undergo much change to restore it to what it was in the days of Washington. After the changes are made in the interior it will be preserved purely as a historic place of national interest.

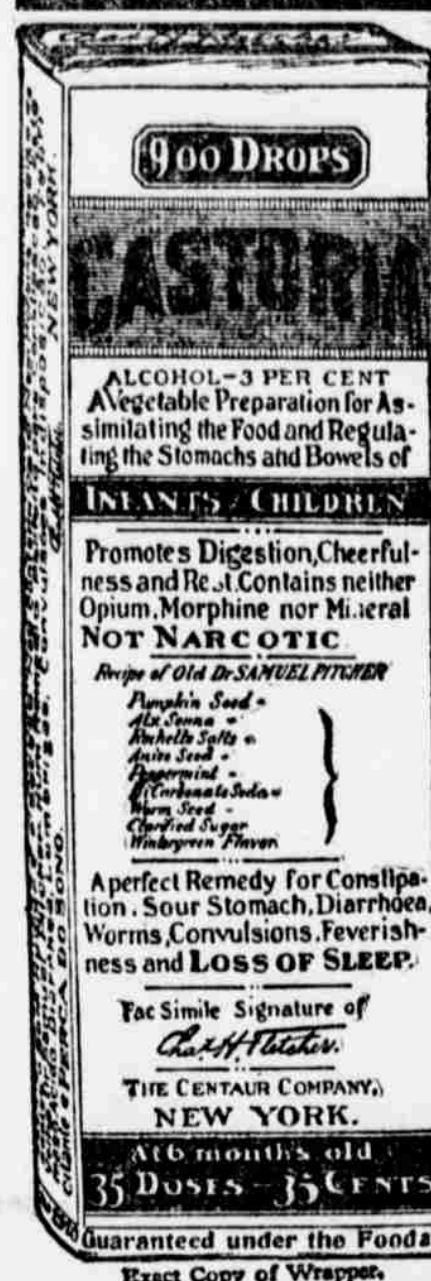

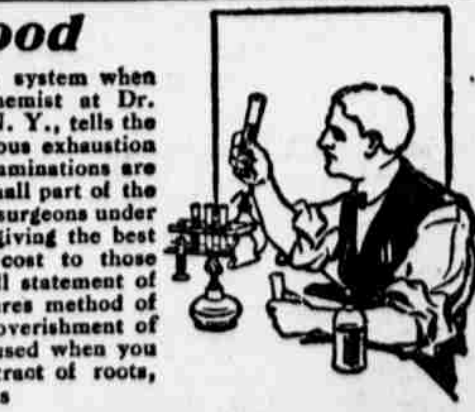
