RED CLOUD BOOSTERS MAKE TOUR OF COUNTY
The Red Cloud boosters to the num-

ber of eighty or more made a tour of the county Wednesday in automobiles advertising their Fourth of July celebration. They reached Blue Hill about 11:30 and remained until after dinner. They were given a hearty reception here and a pleasant visit was enjoyed between the business men of both towns. The Red Cloud band accompanied them and played several selections.

Red Cloud is planning on having an especially good celebration. An unusually large number of attractions are being provided and many of them will be free to the people. We are informed that they would try and make arrangements for a special train to run from Red Cloud to Blue Hill or perhaps Bladen or Campbell in the evening after the celebration. If this can be done they may be sure of an immense crowd from this part of the county. From here the boosters went to Bladen, Campbell, Riverton, Inavale and then home.—Blue Hill Leader.

RED CLOUD BOOSTERS TOUR WEBSTER AND FRANKLIN COUNTIES.
A jolly booster automobile party consisting of about 30 automobiles and 125 men, including the Red Cloud band, made a tour of Webster and Franklin counties Wednesday. The start was made from Red Cloud at about 8 o'clock. Here two autos, driven by Robert Garrison and P. W. Roland, joined them. In Garrison's car were Ed Amack, J. W. Cray and Chas. Hodges; in Roland's car were Mr. Thomas, of Republican City, John T. Kent, of Lincoln, and Harry Vaughan.

Cowles was reached in due time where the citizens welcomed the party warmly. Blue Hill was reached in plenty of time for dinner and the Boosters lined up at the lunch counters and kept the waiters busy for a solid hour. From there the party proceeded west to Bladen, stopping an hour; from there it proceeded to Campbell, where the usual stop was made. Here the party cut across country, 17 miles, to Riverton, where arrangements had been made by the Riverton business men for lunch. Here a longer stop was made than usual, many of the cars having hot boxes from the long drive over the hills. At Inavale, the entire population was out, and altho the boosters were getting tired, the enthusiasm was as much in evidence as any place along the line. The entire trip covered about 85 miles.

The car in which rode the writer was a little late in getting started, and stopped a few minutes in Rosemont where the burglarized bank vault was inspected, cutting across country, catching up with the Boosters at Blue Hill. We called at the Lender office, but editor Lane had gone to dinner. We had friendly visits with editors Spence, of the Bladen Enterprise, and Burr, of the Campbell Citizen. We met W. S. Knapp and G. W. Pool, at Bladen, both sending regards to friends here.

The object of the trip, was the invitation by the Red Cloud Commercial club for every person in the towns visited and adjacent territory, to celebrate July 4th at Red Cloud. Printed matter was freely distributed, besides the hot air furnished free by the several candidates. Nearly every aspiring candidate was in the crowd. It is now up to Red Cloud to entertain us when we go there July 4th, and they promise to do the job right. So far as we could learn, no town visited, expects to have a celebration, and everyone seems willing for Red Cloud to do the honors for the whole of the two counties, for this year.

GOT STUNG.
The most thrilling incident of the trip was when Roland's car ran into a swarm of bees near Blue Hill, and the bull-bee of the bunch made a counter charge, striking the editor on the tip of the nose. This was done after a careful inspection of the noses in the car, when ours was selected altho Kent's nose ran us a close second. He decided to keep his nose on his own side of the car for the rest of the trip.

Several cars hung up on the side hills, where hurry-up repairs were made, but, so far as we know, every car in the bunch made the entire trip without a serious mishap. It was a glorious trip, and at every place the boosters were told that their demonstration was away ahead of that of Lincoln, which passed over the north line in a special train last week.

The booster idea is a popular idea, many of the smaller cities of the state taking it up to advantage since so many autos are owned in every locality. The Guide Rock business men in the bunch Wednesday were busy taking notes and learning the tricks. So we serve warning on our sister towns and they may expect the Guide Rock boosters along some day when we have a warm proposition to promote.—Guide Rock Signal.
