James G. Overman Dies at Long Beach, Calif.

County Commissioner James G. Overman died at Long Beach, Calif., Tuesday afternoon, immediately following an operation. His remains are on the way to Red Cloud, and will probably arrive here Saturday morning.

Mr. Overman went to California last November for a rest, and for the benefit of his wife's health. He liked the country and greatly enjoyed himself, apparently being in the best of health. On last Tuesday he was stricken suddenly with inflammation of the bowels. Physicians said he could not live without an operation, and that even with it there was not one chance in ten. He died on the operating table Tuesday afternoon at 3:30.

James G. Overman was born in Hancock county, Illinois, in 1852. In 1883 he was married to Mattie V. Stratton, and came to Webster county about twenty five years ago. He had held many positions of responsibility, having been three times elected county commissioner, which office he resigned when he went to California last fall. He leaves a wife and two children, William J. Overman and Miss Helen Overman, and one brother and four sisters—Elmer U. Overman and Mrs. Robert Damerell of Red Cloud, Mrs. Swartz, east of Red Cloud; Mrs. Leon Le Maire of Burlington, Ia., and Mrs. Wagoner of West Point, Ill.; also his mother, 84 years of age, who lives with her daughter, Mrs. Damerell, in this city.

John M. Chaffin.

Attorney John M. Chaffin died Saturday morning at 6:30 and was buried from his home Monday morning at 9 o'clock. He came to Webster county about twenty-five years ago; two years later he was married to Anna Jenney of Huron county, Ohio, who survives him.

Mr. Chaffin was born in southern Ohio, of Scotch parentage; removed with his people to Indiana, and enlisted in the Union army at the outbreak of the rebellion. On leaving the army he became a Methodist minister and preached for many years, but later withdrew from the ministry and took up the practice of law for a livelihood. He is survived by a daughter by a previous marriage, the wife of ex-Congressman Charles B. Landis of Indiana. He possessed an extraordinary command of English, and was also an inventor, holding several patents. Though he maintained strict secrecy concerning his age, he is reputed to have been nearly 71 years old. He was devoted to his wife and home, and leaves numerous friends and relatives to mourn his death.
