Educational Advancement.

Your attention is called to the report of school board, found elsewhere in this issue. You will notice that it cost this district last year \$12,751.86 to run our schools. Ten years ago it cost \$6,853.05, and twenty years ago \$7,023,54. At first glance it would seem that there was a great leak somewhere; that our money is being unwisely spent, or that we have doubled our attendance It is probably true that there are more pupils now attending school than ever before. It is also true that our teachers are much better paid than ever before, but that does not represent the real difference between what was expended for school purposes last year and the amounts ten and twenty years ago What to us is the real difference is the change of courses offered. In past years only one course -the classic-was taught in our schools. Every child was pushed through the mill on the theory that he was to be a school

tural education. Our school was merely a teeder for the university and the entire amount of money then spent was for the direct benefit of less than ten per cent of the pupils enrolled, since about ninety per cent drapped out before they completed the Latin sourse. A few years ago all that was PUBLISHER changed, and new courses offered. The practical side of education received attention, and manual training. shorthand and a commercial course were offered. This is worth more to this community than all the drilling in the dead languages and the so-called cultural education. We want graduates who can do things, not be things. "For the past week the temperature has ranged a hundred or over during the day and around 85 during the night. This means that a fertile egg will start hatching unless, as soon as laid, it is placed in a cool cellar or refrigerator, but even this will do no good if, when the farmer comes to town, he loads his eggs and hanls them in the hot sun.
