Experiment Station Bulletin No. 122

The Nebraska Experiment Station has just issued Bulletin No. 122, entitled "Cost of Growing Crops in Nebraska." An average of reports for two years shows that it cost the farmers reporting 29.6 cents per bushel to produce corn, 3214 cents to produce oats, 54.9 cents to produce wheat, \$5.37 per ton to produce wild hay, \$4.18 per ton to produce clover, and \$3.10 per ton to produce alfalfa.

The figures used were secured by correspondence with the best farmers in various communities. The yields are considerably higher than the average yields of the state.

The cost of production does not in- the Democrat and People's man and team at the average rate of 1911. \$3.35 per day, only while in the field. It was found that the two greatest factors influencing the cost per bushel or per ton were the price of land and using better methods of cultivation and better seed. .

At the average market price, the most profitable crops were alfalfa, winter wheat, and corn. Crops which are profitable in one section of the state may not be profitable in another.

It was found that the growing of clover and alfalfa in rotation and the use of barnyard manure greatly reduced the cost of growing corn per bushel. Residents of Nebraska whose names are not on the station mailing list may obtain this bulletin free of cost by ap-
