HEALTH AS AN INVESTMENT

Fraternal Orders, Labor Unions, and Insurance Companies Erect Tuberculous Sanatoriums—Millions Wasted Annually

As an investment in the health of their members, four large fraternal orders, two international labor unions, and one of the largest insurance companies in the United States have established sanatoriums for the treatment of tuberculosis, according to a statement issued today by the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis.

The Royal League, the first fraternal order to establish a sanatorium, conducts a hospital for its tuberculosis members at Black Mountain. The Modern Woodmen of America conducts one at Colorado Springs, the Workmen's Circle, at Liberty, N. Y., and the Independent Order of Foresters have one at Rainbow Lake, N. Y., and will soon open a second one at San Fernando, Cal. The International Typographical Union has since 1893 conducted a sanatorium at Colorado Springs, and the International Printing Pressmen and Assistants Union of America has recently opened a new institution at Rogersville, Tenn. The Metropolitan Life Insurance Company is now erecting a sanatorium at Mt. McGregor, N. Y., which will be the first of its kind to be established by an "old line" insurance company.

In addition to these institutions already established, the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, the Foresters of America, the Knights of Columbus, the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, and several other orders are considering the advisability of erecting sanatoriums for their tuberculosis members. Some of the large fraternal orders and labor unions, like the Ladies of the Maccabees of the World, the International Photo-Engravers Union, and others conduct educational campaigns against tuberculosis though they do not have sanatoriums of their own. The Equitable Life Assurance Society also has recently established a "conservation department" in which the prevention of tuberculosis will be given especial attention. Other insurance companies are considering similar action.

Since the membership of the leading fraternal orders alone is nearly 15,000,000, the National Association estimates that about 30,000 members of these lodges die of tuberculosis alone every year. Since more than half of these lives could be saved at a comparatively small outlay, the association figures that the fraternal orders are losing millions every year in death claims which might be saved.

Newspaper Support.

A newspaper, if it has any brains, conscience and muscle back of it, must continually decide between doing its duty and injuring its pocket. In any position but that of an editor the public is able to separate the individual home from the collective citizen. But if an editor does not please them it's at his pockets they aim. Thus it is the newspapers learn who their friends are. The man who reads the newspaper and admires it all the year round, yet gives his business support to some other concern, whose principles or the actions of its editor he detests, is not a friend to the former newspaper. There are too many men who expect an editor to slave in defense of their pet notions and hobbies and advocate their views against the strongest opposition and coolly withhold the business support by which alone a country newspaper can live.

Talk about a paper having a public duty to perform, and an editor having to work for his principles, is cheap when others stand back and extend a lukewarm neutrality. The result is the editor may starve while laboring for his principles and the cause of right and justice, which they admire but do not support.

What is the Campbell System?

The principles of the Campbell system apply to every country, to every climate, and to every kind of soil. It is a system for the perfect fitting of the soil for the growth of plants, no matter what the plant may be, whether it be wheat, or corn, or cotton, or peanuts.

The Campbell system of soil culture provides for the preparation of a seed and root bed containing the proper amount of both air and water for the liberation of the greatest amount of plant food. In the semi-arid regions and in the irrigated districts this means the storing of moisture in the soil for the use of the plant in time of need. In the humid regions it often means ditching and subdrainage, but at all times and everywhere it means an equalization of moisture in the soil throughout the growing year, so that periods of drouth, that are bound to come, shall have little or no effect on the crop yields.

THE WHY, THE HOW, AND THE WHEN

The trinity of the Campbell system are the Why, the How, and the When. There is no guess work about farming under this system. The farmer who knows the Campbell system and uses it intelligently knows that he will get a crop when he sows his seed—hail and insects alone excepted.

First, the farmer must know why he must do certain things. He must know the scientific principles governing plant life and its relation to the soil. If he does not know this, he is liable to misinterpret conditions and make grievous errors. Second, he must know how to do the necessary things. He must know what machinery to use, and how to apply it. A deep cultivation where a shallow one is needed may destroy his crop. Third, he must know when to do things. To plow when the soil is dry is fatal, to cultivate corn in the morning when it is half grown may do more harm than good, the stalk being brittle, damage may result from the least contact.

The Soldiers' Friends.

Representative Adair of Indiana is a Democrat. Addressing the Republican side of the House recently he observed:

"For fourteen years both branches of Congress have been Republican by large majorities and you have had a golden opportunity to reward the heroes of the civil war; but during all this time you have fed them on promises and pledges, and year after year refused them the pensions they rightfully deserved. . . . The Record will show that practically all the speeches made in the House during the past five years in favor of more liberal pensions have been made by Democrats. . . . We on this side of the House who have been fighting the battles of the old soldier during the past five years understand your methods and purposes, and while you may fool some of the soldiers temporarily you have not fooled us."

Representative Sherwood, of Ohio, Democrat, chairman of the House Pensions Committee and author of a liberal pensions bill, also denounced Republican niggardliness and hypocrisy in respect to pensions.

"When the National Encampment of the Grand Army met in my home town," said he, "the program-fixers left me off the program at all the campfires and went out of their way to humiliate me by having General Keifer speak, because he had attacked me and my pension bill on the floor of Congress. What was the result? In the following November I was elected by twenty-three hundred majority over a Republican who four years before had carried the same district by eighteen thousand majority."—Saturday Evening Post.
