Seed Laboratory Discontinued

During the past three years there has been maintained thru the co-operation of the United States Department of Agriculture and the Nebraska Experiment Station a Branch Seed Laboratory. This Laboratory was connected with the Department of Agricultural Botany, the head of this department being Collaborator in charge of the seed laboratory.

Over 3000 tests of seeds have been made during this period and by this means and thru extensive correspondence there has been aroused among Nebraska farmers great interest in "pure seeds."

The interest in and demand for pure seeds of known quality developed by the work of the Nebraska Seed Laboratory was sufficient to induce the last legislature to enact a law governing the sale of seeds. The enforcement of this law was placed in the hands of the State Food, Drug and Dairy Commissioner.

The State having made provision for the continuation of this work it has been deemed best to discontinue the Nebraska Seed Laboratory. Accordingly correspondence and samples of seeds for test with reference to the new seed law should be sent to the State House. The Department of Agricultural Botany will continue its own investigation of certain seed problems and of Nebraska weeds.

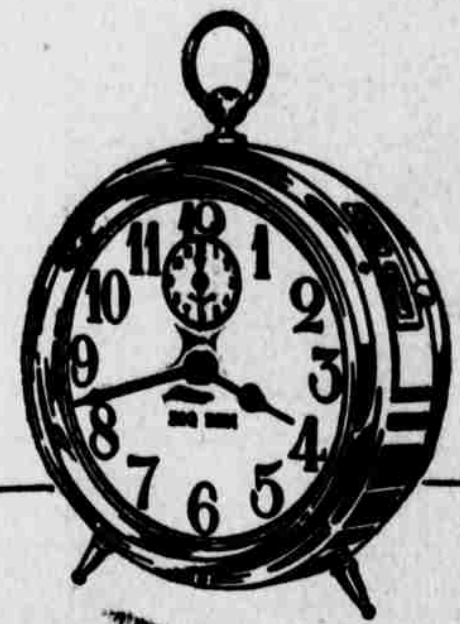
