His education and inclination both would indicate that he would do excellent clerical work. He is an expert rapid and accurate accountant as his three years as book-keeper for Miner Bros. will testify. As deputy county clerk for nearly two years he became thoroughly acquainted with all of the details and intricacies of that office. He is the first candidate in the history of this county to come forward and put a pledge into the hands of every voter in the county to the effect that under no conditions will he be elected as a candidate for a third term. The Chief thinks that Mr. Bailey should and would be an exceptionally strong candidate.

The water problem has been in an acute condition lately. Smith and Nelson the gentlemen who have installed the system of wells to increase the water supply asked the council for water rent which was refused thereupon the water was shut off. This action was simply a misunderstanding of conditions. In the first place the city contracted with a number of citizens and were not authorized in paying the gentlemen who did the work. In the next place no test had been made by the city to find out the quantity of water furnished. Through the instrumentality of the citizens who signed the agreement everything was settled peacefully. A measurement showed that the new system furnished about four-fifths of the water delivered into the south well and at the rate of 18,000 per hour. As that is really more than the present needs of the city it was finally agreed that one dollar per day would be paid for the new system and the water is now connected with the city water works. Under the agreement this amount will be paid until these wells fail to furnish 250,000 gallons per day and Messrs. Smith and Nelson are confident that that time will never come. We trust that this will end our troubles in this direction for one hundred and forty years. Now let everybody drink.

Mr. Bryan's Tribute To McKeighan.
 At the beginning of his speech in Red Cloud last Wednesday, Mr. Bryan said:
 This is one of the cities of our state which I visited very soon after I landed in Nebraska. I came out here at the invitation of one whom I afterwards learned to know very well; one

with whom I served in congress; one whose name has in my recollection been interwoven with the name of your city, and coming among you again my mind turns back to that illustrious townsman, Congressman McKeighan. I was pleased to learn as I came to city this evening that his daughter is a candidate on our ticket this year in this county, and if any word that I can say will add one vote to the vote cast for Miss McKeighan, I will feel that I have been abundantly repaid for coming here. My recollection of Mr. McKeighan is such a delightful one that I am glad at any time to testify to my regard for his merit and my appreciation of his services, and to express my interest in those who are related to him.

The District Judgeship.
 As we get further into the campaign it develops that Judge Dungan has less to contend against than many at first supposed. The fact is that Judge Dungan has made a record in his first term that is a matter of pride, not only to himself, but to those who voted for him four years ago. No judge of the Tenth judicial ever had such a varied lot of cases in the same time as Judge Dungan, and it is wonderful that he got through with so few reversals in the supreme court. In the matter of reversals he stands sixth of thirty-five judges. Did you know that he has tried and determined 1400 cases or one for every day that he has been a district judge? What judge can make a better showing? Besides, he has held court in other districts for other judges, who in turn, have helped him out at times. We mention this only to show that as a first term, Judge Dungan has made a fine record. He ought to carry every county in the district and we fully believe that he will.—Hastings Democrat.

Bryan's Tribute To Judge Dungan.
 In his speeches throughout the district Mr. Bryan has missed no opportunity to express his personal regard for Judge Harry S. Dungan, and has shown a deep interest in his present campaign for re-election as judge of the district court. In his speech at Bloomington, after a personal reference to the candidates on the state ticket, Mr. Bryan referred to Judge Dungan as follows:
 "We have also a candidate for district judge, and I think I know him even better than I know these three candidates for the supreme bench, although I think I know them quite well. I know Judge Dungan more intimately because we were soldiers together. Now, you know when people soldier together they get acquainted. If any of you doubt that, ask any man who went through the war and he will tell you that army life brings out the best that is in men and the worst. After you have served with a man in the army you can generally know what kind of a man he is. I served with Judge Dungan for five months in the army, and while we were in camp I found that the largest part of the duty of an officer was to look after his men. I found that Major Dungan was not only careful to look after the health and physical welfare of his men, but he was always interested in looking after the morals of his men. None of my officers impressed me more favorably than Mr. Dungan did, and no man in my regiment exercised a more wholesome influence upon the other members of the regiment. Knowing him as I do as a man, I am not surprised that he has made a splendid record as an official. I am not surprised that that integrity, that moral worth and that sense of justice that characterized him as an officer in the Third Nebraska is characterized in him in his service on the bench.
