Len Metcalf, aged 29 years died Tuesday evening at 9 o'clock, at the home of his parents north-west of this city. He was born and raised in Webster County. For several years he has been in the portrait business in this city. He has been sickly for the past two months and a week ago he was taken seriously ill and was compelled to go to bed. The cause of his death was blood poisoning. He was a young man of good habits and character and his death will be a sad blow to his parents, relatives and many friends. The funeral took place today from the home and interment took place in the Fisher cemetery. The Chief along with his many friends extend sympathy to the bereaved parents, brothers and sisters during their hour of bereavement.

DIED
John P. Upp was born in York, Pennsylvania, April 3, 1833, and died at his home 12 miles south of this city in Smith County, Kansas, Tuesday, Oct. 17, 1911. He was 78 years, 6 months and 14 days old at the time of his death. He moved to Kansas in 1870 and settled on a homestead and in 1871 he moved his family there and has lived there ever since. He was a soldier in the Civil war and was a member of the 32nd Iowa Volunteers. The funeral services took place Thursday, Oct. 19, at the Oriole school house and interment took place in the Oriole cemetery. Rev. Geo. W. Hummel conducted the funeral services. Mr. Upp was one of Smith County's earliest pioneers. He leaves a family to mourn his death and the Chief along with his many friends extend sympathy to the bereaved family during their hour of bereavement.
