Last Friday marked the close of Paul Storey's term as Grand Master of the Subordinate Lodge of the Nebraska Odd Fellows and that order in its last session showed its appreciation by electing Mr. Storey as Grand Representative to the Sovereign Grand Lodge. He has been an able officer and the order in the state has grown and thrived under his leadership. Grand Master Storey will be remembered principally because it was during his term that the Odd Fellows' Home in York

was dedicated. We give herewith a reproduction of that building as it appears to day. The building is thoroughly fire proof and would pass for "A-1" in New York City. The interior is what is commonly known as the Johnson Fireproof Construction so largely used in Chicago and other large cities and was put in by the National Fireproofing company of Chicago. All floors are of reinforced concrete, overlaid with hollow tiling, that overlaid with cinder concrete, and over that the hardwood flooring. The roof is reinforced concrete and tiling overlaid with cinder cement on which are laid asbestos-cerium shingles. The exterior walls are water and damp proof, even the basement will be at all times and in all weather as dry and wholesome as the floors above.

The building complete cost \$200,000.00 and will be used for caring for the unfortunate members and their children and is a credit to any state.

**E. H. Newhouse.**

**Edson Inconsistent**

**In Campaign for Judge**

"The opposition to Mr. Cressman has been reporting that Judge Edson is running for county judge for the sole purpose of defeating Mr. Ranney. It has been told that Judge Edson himself had admitted that he does not expect to be elected but hopes by remaining on the ticket to defeat Ranney, and that Mr. Cressman is paying Edson's election expenses. Mr. Cressman is not in any way interested in the fight between Ranney and Edson, and any democrat who feels kindly to Mr. Cressman should not be uncoined by the stories of a 'tie up' between Cressman and Edson."

The above article was published in the Commercial Advertiser last week and partly expresses one feature of the county judge situation. That Mr. Edson is in the race for the sole purpose of defeating Mr. Ranney is commonly known; and indeed Mr. Edson himself made the statement several

weeks ago that if he saw later on that if by his staying on the ticket would help defeat Mr. Ranney he would remain, otherwise he would withdraw.

What Mr. Edson's opposition to Mr. Ranney is we have so far failed to learn, unless it is the puerile one of personal feeling from having been defeated at the primary by this gentleman. Following the primary we heard that some friends of Mr. Edson were very wroth over the articles which had been printed in the Leader the week previous, that they were published at a time when Mr. Edson had no opportunity to make answer, and altogether that it was an ungentlemanly method of conducting a campaign; and blamed Mr. Ranney as being the source of the articles.

It is our intention to be fair and deal with the facts as we find them. It has been a number of weeks since that publication date, still we have yet had no reply from Mr. Edson telling us if any wrong statements were made. If he can show where we erred we will be pleased to make correction. And for the benefit of those who wish to connect Mr. Ranney with their authorship we will say that he had nothing whatever to do with that issue of the Leader nor did he know what was published therein until he got his paper through the mails the same as other subscribers. The editor of the Leader alone is responsible for the articles in question.

Mr. Edson was defeated at the primary by a large majority of the combined democratic and independent voters, but on the independent ticket Mr. Ranney received 76 votes and Mr. Edson 89, the latter having a majority of 13 votes. His remaining on the ticket is an act against all precedent all over the state. Mr. Wright of Rosemont also received a majority on the independent ticket for treasurer, yet he realized the fallacy of remaining on the ticket. Two years ago Mr. Arnold received the independent nomination for treasurer but withdrew and came out supporting the man who had defeated him on the joint ballot. Not only in this but all counties of the state it is understood that when a candidate is beaten by a majority of votes on the fusion ticket he is down and out.

Mr. Edson has been in office for ten years, yet one of the strongest planks in the platform of the party he now claims allegiance to is opposed to an official holding office for more than two terms. So you see, on every side he is inconsistent. He knows, and the people know that he cannot be elected, yet he wishes if possible by any means to injure the cause of the people's candidate and the democratic party.

As for Mr. Cressman, the republican nominee, we believe him to be a perfect gentleman, and qualified as well as many other people in the county to hold that office, but the people can readily see the superior fitness and claims of Mr. Ranney. All we desire of every voter is to examine into Mr. Ranney's record. He has been a resident of the county thirty-four years and has done much more than the average man for the welfare of the people. He is one of our best citizens and the people should be pleased to honor him by electing him for county judge and we believe they will do so. —Blue Hill Leader.
