

POPULAR HERO GONE

Death of Admiral Schley Recalls Santiago Victory.

Famed for Rescue of Greely Arctic Expedition and Later Prominent In Spanish-American War Naval Fight.

New York.-Rear Admiral Winfield Scott Schley, retired, who dropped dead the other day in this city, was famed for the rescue of the Greely arctic expedition and was the popular hero of the famous naval battle of Santiago, July 3, 1898. Admiral Schley was born October 9, 1839, near Frederick City, Md. He was the son of John Thomas Schley, who served in the navy during the Mexican war. In 1856 Admiral Schley was appointed to the Naval academy at Annapolis, and completed his studies there in 1860. After his graduation from Annapolis he rose in the naval world step by step, winning promotion and honor by dint of meritofious service and bravery.

Although Winfield Scott Schley was famed for his bravery in rescuing the crew of the famous arctic expedition in 1884, he came most prominently before the world in the naval engagement of Santiago. It was for his work on this occasion that he became one of the popular naval heroes of the American people. The controversy which followed the battle, regarding who was the real hero. Sampson or Schley, was one of the most regrettable incidents that arose from the Spanish war. Schley, in his own humble way, answered the controversy most fairly by his famous comment, "There is glory enough for

It is an irony of history that, in the arguments which arose in lieu of the disagreement over the honors of Santiago, Schley should have been charged with cowardice. It was he who, in 1862, in the face of almost certain death, went out with a small boat and rescued a beleaguered ship from the fire of the Confederate guns; it was he who charged first over the redoubt at Corea and when his comrade fell dead at his side shot his

slayer and vaulted over the embankment, leaving his men to follow him; it was Admiral Schley who braved the terrors of the actic winter and brought back in safety the explorers who, entrapped by arctic ice for more than six months, nearly died from exposure and starvation.

Winfield Scott Schley was known among naval men as a dashing commander before the war with Spain. He had creditably disciplined Chinese and Corean coolles, protected the American consulate in San Salvador during a revolution and had behaved with gallantry and diplomacy when American sailors were assailed by a mob in Valparaiso. He was a typical naval man, a leader and a strategist, and he will go down in history as one of America's great naval heroes.

In recognition for his heroism in rescuing Greely congress rewarded him with a medal and the citizens of Maryland presented him with a handsome gold watch which he carried until the day of his death. President Arthur also rewarded Schley by making him chief of the bureau of equipment and recruiting. He held this office until his resignation in 1889. In later years he was honored by being placed in command of the body of John Ericsson, the inventor of the Monitor, with the commission to bear it to Sweden for burial. His last commission was the New York, the flagship of the North Atlantic squadron. Since his retirement Admiral Schley led a quiet life. He had been at Lake George all summer and was on his way to his home in Washington when he was stricken.
